RABBIT CATCHER was bred by the late Sir Thomas Stanley, Bart., formerly one of the most eminent Turfmen in England. He was foaled in 1837, and was got by Bird Catcher, dam by Tramp, grand-dam by Williamson's Ditto out of Young Rachel by Volunteer;—g. g. grand-dam by Highflyer; g. g. g. grand-dam by Syphon; g. g. g. g. grand-dam by Regulus—Snip—Cottingham Warlock Galloway—Snake, &c.

Bird Catcher was by St. Patrick (winner of the St. Ledger), dam Hedley Mare (sister to Lusa), the dam also of Birdlime, Pick Pocket, Jack Spigo, and other capital runners—grand-dam Jersey by Totteridge, her dam Cracker by Highflyer out of Nutcracker by Match'em.

Tramp was by Dick Andrews, his dam by Gohanna out of Flaxteela by Trenham; Dick Andrews was by Joe Andrews, he by English Eclipse.

St. Patrick was by Walton, he by Sir Peter Teazle, he by Highflyer, he by Herod, he by Tartar—Partner—Jigg—Byerly Turk, &c.

Williamson's Ditto was by Walton out of Arethusa by Dunganon, he out of Aspasia by English Eclipse.

Than which, a richer or purer pedigree, no horse in America can boast.

Rabbit Catcher complained a little last spring, owing, perhaps, to the voyage he had just made, which was in part the reason his services were not then offered to the public; but he is now in fine health and vigor, and I with confidence offer him to a discerning public as a race-horse of the first order of merit, both as to form, pedigree and performance.
