The Right Sort.

I have been a Congregational pastor for fifty years, but I have never preached a sermon on Congregationalism. I don't believe in isms. I believe in the church of the Lord Jesus Christ.—Rev. Dr. J. M. Greene.

There is a noble sentiment nobly expressed by a noble man. How many clergymen of Rev. Dr. Greene's venerable years, recalling as they must a good deal of the sentiment of old-time Congregationalism which was rife when he began his ministry, can lay claim with so much justice to such simple, but sufficient, liberty of mind? To assume that no man can come into heaven save by one particular door is not unjust, if one is broad enough to adopt the sentiment in the sense it was first intended by the first who gave utterance to it. But with the advance of years, and with the manifold divisions of the Christian faith into churches with differing beliefs, not originating with Jesus, but, let us say, with Paul and Apollos, have come petty assumptions that the one door leading to salvation of the soul is a door marked with some "ism or other. Illiberality in the pulpit is by no means unknown today, despite occasional shining examples like that quoted above, of the contrary spirit, which is willing to pass over the minor differences of human creed and the minutiae of human belief and assert that, after all, the church has one foundation amply sufficient for all to stand upon and be right. And yet, even today, we find strait-laced denominational clergymen defending the spirit that would shut out eminent Unitarians from a church conference because they are not "evangelical," though doubtless devoutly Christian in most details. It is refreshing to find a man of Dr. Greene's standing and general acceptance to manhood, proclaiming this wholesome and Christlike belief, in such strong relief to the actions of other men, of more petty and uncompromising devotion to doctrinal tenets, whose attitude has led one high in educational circles to say that it is often surprising "how un-Christlike some Christians can be on occasion."—Lowell Courier.

Drunkenness Among Nations.

Which is the most inebriate country in the world? In the current Harper's Weekly Mr. Sydney Brooks gives some interesting facts bearing upon this point. Apropos of the drink question in England, he points out that countries that drink the most are not necessarily the most drunken. On paper the greatest drinkers in the world are the French, yet France is a notoriously temperate country. Her statistics of police drunkenness are less than one-fourth the English record. Italy, Spain and Portugal, being wine-growing and wine-drinking countries, have large statistics of consumption, but are, as a matter of fact, exceedingly temperate. Northern Russia, Scandinavia and Scotland are the most drunken parts of Europe, though the consumption of alcohol per head is comparatively low. For the past ten years England has spent on drink from \$875,000,000 to \$950,000,000 a year. Her average annual expenditure on drink amounts, therefore, to a sum that is more than the entire annual revenue.

A monster eagle flew into the cab of the Rock Island Railroad's Rocky Mountain limited, and while the train was going full speed attacked and knocked senseless the engine driver and then made an attack on the fireman, says a Limon, Colo., dispatch. The bird fastened its talons in the fireman's arms, but was beaten down with a shovel and captured.
