Platform of the National Prohibition Party.

Adopted at the Chicago Convention, Sept. 2, 1869.

WHEREAS, Protection and allegiance are reciprocal duties, and every citizen who yields obedience to the just commands of his government is entitled to the full, complete and perfect protection of that government in the enjoyment of personal security, personal liberty, and private property;

WHEREAS, The traffic in intoxicating drinks greatly impairs the personal security and personal liberty of large masses of citizens, and renders private property insecure;

WHEREAS, The existing parties are hopelessly unwilling to adopt an adequate policy on this question, therefore we, in national convention assembled, as citizens of this free republic, sharing in the duties and responsibilities of its government, in the discharge of a solemn duty we owe to our country, do hereby unite in the following declaration of principles:

1. That while we acknowledge the pure patriotism and profound statesmanship of those patriots who laid broad and deep the foundations of this government, securing at once the rights of the States severally and their inseparable union by the Federal Constitution, we would not merely garnish the sepulchers of our republican fathers, but we do hereby renew our solemn pledges of civil and religious liberty embodied in the Declaration of American Independence and our Federal Constitution.

2. That the traffic in intoxicating beverages is dishonour to a Christian civilization, inimical to the best interests of society, a political wrong of unequalled enormity, subversive of the ordinary objects of government, not capable of being regulated or restrained by any system of license whatever, but imperatively demanding for its suppression effective legal prohibition both by State and National Legislation.

3. That in view of this, and inasmuch as the existing political parties either oppose or ignore this question, and amount question, and absolutely refuse to do anything toward the suppression of the rum traffic, which is robbing the nation of its highest intellects, despoiling its material property, and rapidly undermining its very foundations, we are driven by an imperative sense of duty to sever our connection with these political parties, and to organize ourselves into a National Prohibition Party, having for its primary object the entire suppression of the traffic in intoxicating drinks.

4. That while we adopt the name of the National Prohibition Party, as expressive of our primary object, and while we denounce all repudiation of the public debt, and pledge fidelity to the principles of the Declaration of Independence and the Federal Constitution, we deem it inexpedient to give prominence to other political issues.

5. That a Central Executive Committee of one from each State and Territory and the District of Columbia, be appointed by the Chair, whose duty it shall be to take such action as in their judgment will best promote the interests of the party.

THE CONVENTION.

Elsewhere will be found the report of the Prohibition County Convention, held in Morris' Hall, on last Saturday. The Convention was not large, but still it was full as large as it was expected to be. It being on Saturday, the business men of the two towns could not leave their business to attend, and all know that this is a specially busy time with the farmers. But, notwithstanding all this, there were thirty-five delegates enrolled, making the Convention very respectable in size as well as in spirit. The spirit of the Convention was obvious to anyone. It was that of a body of quiet, determined men, resolved to carry out their convictions of right. The ticket nominated is acknowledged to be one of the best, if not the best ever presented to the voters of Morgan County by any party. We have no space for a further mention of the Convention or the ticket this week, but will refer all to the official report as found in another column.

Crime in Connecticut.

The following are Connecticut criminal items: Of 2,593 commitments to the common jails of the State last year, 104 were for drunkenness, 408 for burglary, 227 for larceny, 87 for vagrancy, 66 for burglary, 87 for assisting at a prize fight, 10 of the whole number of victims 2,560 were of intermediate habits and only 108 strictly temperate—a fact which is of itself a pretty good temperance lecture. Hartford County furnished most, 624. New Haven County, 629, and Tolland County, 31. There were 247 more commitments than in 1870.

We see by a Norwalk paper that Gideon T. Stewart, Prohibition Candidate for Governor, is soon to take the stump in view of making a thorough canvass of the State. It is hoped that he will not fail to give Morgan County a call. Mr. Stewart is one of the ablest public speakers in Ohio, and he will make it hot for the old political parties wherever he may go.

Proceedings of the Morgan County Prohibition Convention.

MORNING SESSION.

Pursuant to call as published in the South Eastern Independent, the Morgan County Prohibition Convention, for the purpose of nominating a County Ticket, convened in Morris' Hall, of McConneville, on Saturday, June 10th, 1871, at 10 o'clock, A. M. The call to order was made by Arza Alderman, who, after stating the object of the Convention, called upon the Rev. G. J. Smith, formerly of the Methodist Church of South Bloomingville, Hocking County, to lead in prayer. After prayer, a permanent organization was formed by choosing J. D. Maris, of Chesterfield, Chairman, and J. W. Harper, of Homer township, and Joseph A. Kelly, of McConneville, Secretaries. The convention immediately proceeded to business, appointing E. S. Fawcett, of Marion, J. C. Murdock, of Malta, and Albert Hamilton, of Windsor, a committee of enrollment; Arza Alderman, of Morgan, John G. Walker, of Malta, Jacob Wortman, of Bristol, Dr. S. Branson, of Marion, and Samuel Murry, of Meigsville, a committee to report a ticket; David Mumme, of Morgan, Jacob F. Mumme, of Meigsville, and Dr. S. Branson, of Marion, a committee on resolutions; Thomas Dewees, of Penn. Dr. D. N. Allard, of Marion, and J. T. Crew, of Morgan, a committee to report a Central Committee for the ensuing year. There being no further business at this time before the Convention, a motion to adjourn until 1 1/2 o'clock, P. M., was made and carried.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

Convention called to order promptly by the Chairman at the hour designated at the adjournment of the morning session. Committee on enrollment reported delegates as follows:

Sears, and William Mendenhall, all of Penn township. J. C. Murdock, J. G. Walker, Thomas Williams, J. D. Sear, Samuel Carman, and A. W. Power, all of Malta township. Jacob Wortman, of Bristol township. J. F. Mumme, Samuel Murry, and James A. Neely, all of Meigsville township. Albert Hamilton, of Windsor township. J. W. Harper, of Homer township.

The Committee on Resolutions being ready to report, they done so as follows:

Resolved, That we heartily endorse and accept as our Platform of Principles, the Platform of the National Prohibition Party, adopted by the National Prohibition Convention, held in Chicago, September 2nd, 1869; and also the Resolutions passed by the Prohibition State Convention, held in Delaware, Ohio, on the 22nd of February, 1871; and that we pledge ourselves to the earnest support of the State Ticket, nominated by said Delaware Convention, and headed by Gidson T. Stewart for Governor.

Resolved, That while we will ever strive for such legislation as is demanded by our Party throughout the State and the Nation, we will also use our utmost endeavors to have the existing Liquor Laws of our State, and our Villages, enforced with the utmost rigidity and to the fullest limit of their letter and spirit; and also, that we will encourage and aid to the extent of our ability, all moral suasion efforts to mitigate the evils of intemperance.

Resolved, That, as citizens of this community, recognizing the benefits that will arise to ourselves, our neighbors, and to future generations through the instituting of manufactures, railroads, and like enterprises, in our midst, we will encourage and aid such enterprises in every way in our power.

Resolved, That we believe it to be the duty of all our citizens to patronize home institutions to the full extent practicable, thereby assisting in building up one another, and keeping the wealth of the County within its borders.

Resolved, That in the South Eastern Independent we have a County organ worthy of our full support, and that we should all give it our patronage and use our influence in extending its circulation.

On question put by the chairman asking what should be done with the resolutions, a motion and second was made to adopt them as reported, which was done unanimously.

Rest of committee not being ready to report, and no business being before the Convention, J. C. Turner was called on for a speech. He responded by entertaining the audience for about twenty minutes, after which the remaining committee were ready to report.

Committee on Central Committee reported for such Committee for the ensuing year, Jephtha Doudra, Thomas T. Nott, Moses McDaniel, A. W. Power, J. C. Murdock, and J. F. Mumme. For an Advisory Committee, W. M. Cool, of Bristol, David W. Green, of Chester, J. W. Harper, of Homer, Dr. S. Branson, of Marion, Jephtha Doudra, and J. T. Crew, of Morgan, Albert Hamilton, of Windsor, A. J. S. Gift, of York, and William Strude and Benjamin Brown, of Penn. The report was unanimously adopted as reported.
