Revolution in France.

The news from Paris is of the most serious character. The greater part of the city is in the hands of a mob of Red Republicans, who have erected barricades and armed them with cannon.

Several officers in command of the regulars have been taken prisoners, and shot after a summary trial before a revolutionary tribunal.

What will be the outcome of this, is very difficult to predict. The Paris mob wants the Assembly to hold its sessions in the city, so that it may be in the power of the ultra, on the one hand, to overthrow the republic and establish a monarchy.

The origin of the trouble is stated in a New York telegram, of the 20th, to be as follows: Private dispatches state that the revolution in Paris has its origin in an anti-church movement incited by the Italians.
