Republican State Convention.
 The Republican State Convention was held in Columbus on Monday and Tuesday of this week, Governor Nash being renominated but Caldwell was turned down for Lieutenant Governor in favor of Carl Nippert of Cincinnati. Hanna was in complete control of the convention.

Chuck Armstrong Defeated.
 If there ever was a throw down Marshal Armstrong got it at Saturday's Republican county primary. He has always lined up and fought with the White crowd in this county and helped them get on top and then they threw him down to a queen's taste Saturday. His opponent, Thomas, was nominated for sheriff by several hundred majority.

Very Clear Now.
 A very innocent looking paragraph appeared in the State Journal Monday that made a rattling in the high grass in Logan Republican circles. The newspaper in commenting on the arriving of delegates said that the Athens delegation were on the ground headed by D. H. Moore and were solid for John F. White, of Logan, for State Central Committeeman from this district, Mr. Moore retiring.

When that innocent little paragraph was read in Logan it came as a thunderbolt to the friends of Judge Bright, and made it very clear why Bright was thrown down in Athens. If John White had fought the bitter fight for Bright that he pretended in opposition to Dave Moore, why would Moore rally to White's support at the district meeting of the state convention and make him state central committeeman, Moore retiring in White's favor. There is something rotten in the state of Denmark.

Death of John A. Shaw.
 The death of John A. Shaw last Friday though expected for weeks came nevertheless as a shock to our community. He has been in declining health for two years and of late grew rapidly worse, until gentle Providence took his spirit home. His remains were tenderly laid away under auspices of the I. O. O. F. of which he was a member. A large concourse of our citizens attended the funeral at Smith's Chapel on Monday.

John A. Shaw was a man of affairs in this county. In 1868 he was elected Treasurer of this county serving seven years. Later he was elected Infirmary Director and served in that office several years. In his township of Green he has served as Treasurer, though the township is strongly in opposition to him in politics.

In social life he was a pleasant, genial gentleman and was friendly to all who met him. Of a cheerful disposition, avoiding quarrels and acting as peacemaker in the differences of others. He was one of the grand men of our county and his death is deplored by all. John A. Shaw was born at Frederick City, Maryland, Dec. 21, 1830. Died at his home in Green Tp., Hocking Co., Ohio, June 21, 1901, aged 70 years and 6 months.

He came with his parents to Perry Co., Ohio, before he was a year old and in 1839 they came to Hocking Co. Jan. 13, 1853, he was married to Josephine Rolsten. This union was blessed with nine children all of whom are living. He was converted in 1859 and united with the English Lutheran church but later became a member of the M. E. church at Smith chapel and remained a faithful member till the end. His funeral was held from his home church Monday, June 24, Rev. J. F. Williams of Logan, Rev. J. H. Westervelt, his pastor, and Rev. B. F. Evans, his former pastor, officiating, after which the solemn and impressive burial service of the

Odd Fellow's order was read by the officers of his lodge, and his remains were laid to rest in the beautiful cemetery back of the church. Of a truth it can be said of him he was an honest man and a christian, which attributes form the highest type of perfection in one of God's created beings.

Death of Kirtz Stiers.
 George Kirtz Stiers, son of Al. Stiers, aged 14 years, died at his home Wednesday morning of heart failure resultant from tuberculosis; funeral will take place at 6 o'clock this evening from the home.

This is sad news to the many friends of Mr. and Mrs. Al. Stiers and family. Kirtz was a general favorite among the young people and his death comes as a personal grief to our whole community. He was a kindly, gentle, genial, promising young boy, just entering the High School, with a future before him bright as the noon-day sun. His early taking off brings us to a halt in the on-rush of life, and the thought that it is not always the old, who have lived out many years of time, that are taken off. The promising young man surrounded by kindly parents and hosts of friends to encourage him to good things, is cut down in the morning of life, and he is no more. Thus it is and we can not tell why. It is but the province of poor weak humanity to thank God that He does not punish our short comings with greater sorrows.
