AN ORDINANCE

To Levy Special Assessments for the Purpose of Paying a Portion of the Expense of Improving Main Street from Gallagher Avenue to the West Side of Culver Street by Paving.

Be it ordained by the Council of the Village of Logan, State of Ohio:

Section 1. That to pay the portion of the costs and expenses for the improvement of Main Street from Gallagher Avenue to the west side of Culver Street by paving, heretofore determined to be specially assessed upon the property abutting upon the said portion of said street, to-wit, two thirds of the whole cost exclusive of the intersections, there be levied and assessed upon each foot front of the lots and lands abutting upon said improvement, described in the schedule of lots and lands hereto attached and made a part of this ordinance, the sum of \$2.33 per foot front of the several amounts therein set forth.

Section 2. That each of said lots or tracts of abutting lands are hereby determined to be benefited by said improvement in an amount not less than the assessment hereby levied upon the same.

Section 3. That the total assessment against each lot or tract of land shall be payable in cash within thirty days from the date of the final passage of this ordinance, or in ten equal annual installments with interest on deferred payments at the rate of 4 per cent. per annum, after due at the option of the owner.

Section 4. All cash payments shall be made to the Village Treasurer. All installments of assessments together with interest on remaining installments of assessments shall be certified by the Village Clerk to the County Auditor, on or before the second Monday in September annually, to be by him placed upon the tax duplicate and collected as other taxes are collected.

Section 5. That all cash payments of said assessments, together with all installments of assessments and all portions thereof, shall be applied to the payment of the bonds heretofore issued or to be issued for the purpose of improving said part of Main Street, and to the payment of the interest thereon as the same shall become due, and to no other purpose whatsoever.

Section 6. That this ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after the earliest period allowed by law.
