Council Proceedings.

Council met in regular session Tuesday evening with eight members present.

An ordinance establishing a street passenger railway to be known as Route No. 2, requiring the completion of an electric railway line within one year, was read by the Solicitor. Upon motion the ordinance was referred to a committee of the whole, to meet Thursday afternoon at 3 p. m.

A petition from Kaiser, Gracey and Moore, requesting extension of proposed street railway route No. 2 to include the West Side and "Texas" was referred to Council as a committee of the whole.

The matter of a sidewalk from the railroad bridge to Front street was referred, upon motion, to the bridge committee and Solicitor.

Manager Reed, of the River Gas Co., appeared before Council and explained that the shortage complained of in the supply of natural gas for the electric plant boilers is due to the fact that the supply pipe from regulator on rear of city lot is too small. Upon motion the Gas Co. was authorized to enlarge the pipe in order to furnish a sufficient supply of gas, the work to be done at the company's expense.

The report of the Mayor for the month of January showed fines and costs collected to the amount of \$81; paid to the city \$54.35; fines and costs worked out, \$10; cash paid to city, \$38.25.

The Janitor's report for January showed receipts for rent of City Hall for month \$182, balance due this date \$118.50.

FEED UPON SALT WATER.

Countless Living Things That Exist in the Depths of the Ocean.

The salts of the sea have fed throughout all time countless things which have thronged its waters and whose remains now form the rocks of the continents or lie spread in beds of unknown thickness over 66,000,000 square miles of the 143,000,000 square miles of the ocean's floor; they have lent the substance to build the fringing reefs of the land and all the coral islands of the sea, and there are at present, on the basis of an average salinity of 3 1/2 per cent., in the 290,700,000 cubic miles of water which makes up the oceans, 90,000,000,000,000 tons, or 10,173,000 cubic miles of salt. This is sufficient to cover the areas of all the lands of the earth with a uniform layer of salt to a depth of 1,000 feet.

It seems, says Popular Science Monthly, that the sea was made salt in the beginning as a part of the grand design of the Creator to provide for the system of evolution which has been going on since the creation. Many distinct species of living organisms live in the sea as a result of its salinity, and their remains have largely contributed to the growth of continents. The three great factors in accounting for the system of currents in the ocean, by which it becomes the great heat distributor of the globe, are changes of temperature, the winds and salinity. The last mentioned becomes an important factor through the immediate and essential differences of specific gravity and consequent differences of level that it produces in different parts of the ocean through the action of evaporation and rainfall.

Provocation for a Lawsuit.

There is a story told of a very eminent lawyer now no longer with us, who once, while endeavoring to dissuade a friend from going to law, was asked what he would himself consider sufficient ground for resorting to litigation. "My dear fellow," he replied, "I do not say that under no conceivable circumstances would I take proceedings against anyone, but I do say that if this moment you deliberately upset my ink on the table, chucked my wife out of the window, threw that volume of reports at the bust of Dickens, 'made hay' with my furniture and finally tweaked my nose, I should, no doubt, use my best endeavors to kick you downstairs; but once rid of you, either by force or persuasion, no power on earth should induce me to bring an action against you."

Associates of the Shark.

A small fish called the pilot is nearly always found with the man-eating shark. Each shark is accompanied by from five to seven (always by an odd number, it is claimed) of these little vassals, and while his sharkship seems to be incessantly looking for something wherewith to satisfy his voracious appetite he never eats these little pilots, though they keep very close to him. Another frequent associate of the shark is the remora, or sucker fish. Nature has provided it with a large, circular disk on the top of its head. By means of this "sucker" it attaches itself to the under surface of the shark and is carried by it wherever it goes.

A WOMAN TRAVELER.

Miss Kingsley Accomplished Much During Her Journey in Africa.

Miss Kingsley has explored the Cameroons region, West Africa, and her adventures proved both interesting and exciting. During a canoe journey up the Ogowe river the canoe was upset nearly a dozen times and the intrepid lady explorer and her party of natives were thrown into the water.

But perhaps the most disagreeable experience was encountered in the Fangwe country. The Fangwes are cannibals, and are one of the few tribes in Africa which eat their own dead. The people were friendly toward Miss Kingsley, but she had great trouble in preventing them from killing and eating some of her servants. She did not come across one burial place in the Fangwe country; but she found that in most of the native mud huts pieces of human beings were being kept, just as civilized people keep fresh meat and other eatables in their larders. On one occasion when Miss Kingsley was turning out the contents of a sack to try and find out the origin of a sickening smell, hands, feet, eyes and other human remains tumbled out on the ground.

Although this remarkable lady slept often in the open air, was drenched with rain many times, and experienced almost every variety of temperature, she enjoyed excellent health, and intends to return to West Africa in a few weeks' time.

AMUSING TRICK.

With Which to Entertain at Little Expense.

A neat trick, affording considerable amusement at little expense, can be produced by causing a candle to burn while almost immersed in a tumbler of water. The experiment is as follows: Insert a nail—not too heavy—in the lower end of a short candle to order to make that end heavier, and place the whole in a glass containing enough water to reach the upper end of the candle without wetting the wick.

At first thought nothing seems stranger than to expect a candle to be entirely consumed in such a situation; but it is simple enough. As the candle burns it grows lighter and lighter, and rises gradually as it diminishes in length, so that the lighted end always remains above the surface of the water. Moreover, the outside of the candle, being cooled, will melt much more slowly than usual, and the flame will make a little hollow in the center. This hollow place also helps in making the candle float, and preserves the wick from contact with the water. Thus the candle will continue to burn in its strange candlestick until the wick is entirely consumed.


