DISASTROUS BLAZE.

An Aged Woman Burned to Death at Ellenboro.

ELLENBORO, W. Va., March 13.—At an early hour this morning the residence of James M. Hall was discovered to be on fire. The aged mother of Mr. Hall, who was making her home with him, was suffocated and burned to death before she could be rescued from the burning building.

From the dwelling house the flames attacked a large store adjoining, also owned by Hall, and it was likewise destroyed with all its contents. The property loss is placed at \$15,000.

The fire was caused by natural gas. The gas fittings were imperfect, and the escaping gas filled the house, finally coming in contact with a living flame. It was ignited, and an explosion setting the house afire at once followed. Heroic efforts were made to rescue the aged Mrs. Hall, but all efforts were fruitless.

At one time it was feared the flames would absorb the entire town, but the fight made against their spreading was sufficient to keep them within the bounds of the property mentioned.


