IN THE OIL FIELDS.

Sistersville, W. Va., March 17.—Shay and McMullins' well on the Dan Weekly farm still continues to increase its production and is now making a little better than 40 barrels an hour, and is still increasing.

The Devonian Oil Company has made a couple of locations on the Mahan farm, which joins the well recently drilled in by Bettman, Watson & Bernheimer, and will erect a rig at once.

The well drilled by McGuire & Co. on the Thorn farm back of Friedly, is now reported to be making between 15 and 20 barrels of oil a day.

A location has been made on the northeast corner of the W. P. Hays farm, located to the southwest of the Davenport farm, and the necessary material for rigging up will be placed on the ground as soon as possible.

Ramey & Co. have made a location on the southwest corner of the Davenport and will commence erecting a rig at once.

Barnsdall and the Natural Gas company of West Virginia, are making a number of locations on their leases, including some on the Braken farm, where the big gusher came in on Thursday of last week.—Intelligencer.

The greater portion of wheat in this end of the county was sown late last fall, and to say that it looks badly hardly expresses the condition, as the most of it is invisible. The cold dry winter has been especially hard on meadows and pastures and many clover fields make such a poor showing that it is not profitable to allow them to stand for hay. Plows are running and the ground is breaking in fine condition. The thorough pulverizing by drought and cold weather was the chief factor which produced the splendid corn crop of last year.
