Mr. Weis has purchased a half interest in the drugstore of his father at Dayton, O., and will remove with his family to that city. During the years he has been associated with Marietta in a business way Mr. Weis has made many friends who will regret to learn of his departure.

—The Junior Club will be entertained this evening by Dr. C. T. Waters.

—C. W. Stanley and Edward Hardy, of Lower Salem, were in the city on business Saturday.

—W. B. Gaitree, Vice President of the Ohio Republican League, was in the city Sunday, the guest of his father Capt. J. F. Gaitree, and incidentally looking after matters political.

—Mr. Lou Deal left Saturday night for Carey, O., having received intelligence of the death of his mother which occurred Saturday. He will return home this week.

—Cool's Big Stock Co. Auditorium tonight in "The Arabian Nights."

—About nine o'clock Saturday evening Mrs. J. A. Donaldson, during a temporary aberration of mind, attempted to drown herself by jumping off the wharfoat into the Ohio river. Luckily she struck the water feet foremost and the air under her clothing buoyed her up and prevented her sinking. She floated quite a distance down the river, almost to the ferry float, where she was rescued by Harry Fuller. Mrs. Donaldson, is the wife of J. A. Donaldson, the well known oil man, with whom she has been living at the National House. She has been seriously ill for some time and it is thought that on account of this fact and medicine she has been taking her mind became temporarily deranged. She was resting easy at last report and will probably suffer no serious consequences as a result of her cold bath.

—George Rice is in the city.

—Col. W. B. Gaitree and wife arrived in the city yesterday.

—Grafton & Noll received a telegram from their driller Saturday night regarding their Archers Forks well, and it was most gratifying in its nature. The message said that the well was most promising; that the drill was only through the cap, and that oil was flowing through the casing. The well is in the "Big Injun" sand, and the probability is that our friends have struck it rich. Later news is to the effect that the drill was put a screw and a half in the sand and the hole filled with oil to the depth of 700 feet. The work will now wait on tankage.

—Mrs. Charles C. Bennett died at Adrian, Pa., on the 15th instant, aged 22 years, and was buried at her old home in Martinsburg, W. Va., on the 18th. The deceased was a daughter-in-law of W. P. Bennett, of this city.

—George B. Sunderland sold a lot in the East End Saturday to C. Baltz, this city.

—George Kerps, of the West Side, was arrested Saturday night for assaulting an itinerant saw filer, an old man who was plying his vocation about the city. Kerps demanded that the old man treat him, and when the latter refused, Kerps assaulted him and bit his ear. The hearing will be at 10 o'clock this morning.

—Deputy Sheriff McCallister went to Athens Saturday afternoon, having in custody Thomas McFarland, of Belpre township, who was placed in the State Hospital for treatment for insanity. Mr. McFarland is upwards of 50 years of age and has a family.

—Deputy O. M. Steen returned from Columbus Saturday night, having in custody H. C. Davis, alias Frank Gloeckner, who is serving time in the Penitentiary, having been sent up from Meigs county on the charge of robbery. Gloeckner was a partner of Harry Thompson, who will be tried today on an indictment for pocket picking, and is wanted as a witness. Mrs. Gloukner and Mrs. Thompson, wives of the men mentioned, the latter being a bride of but a few days when Thompson was arrested, are here to attend the trial. Guard Grimes, of the Penitentiary, is also here to look after Gloeckner.

—H. E. Smiley, of Beverly, has accepted a position as manager of T. C. Fowler's merchandise brokerage business in this city.

—The case of Ohio vs. Andrew Schwendeman, indicted for participating in the whitecapping of Jacob Schaad, will be tried in Common Pleas Court Wednesday. The similar cases against his brothers, Frank and Peter, and Joseph Kerns, will be heard later.

—The electric street lights were not going last night, it being necessary to cool down the boilers to allow them to be cleaned today.

—J. E. McCoy Rebekeh Lodge, No. 200, will give a social and entertainment at their hall Tuesday night, March 24th. Everybody invited.

**IN THE OIL FIELDS.**  
ST. MARYS

Though the weather has been anything but favorable, there has been considerable activity in this field during the last week.

The John Colmar well drilled by Mallory Bros. on Broad Run is in the sand, and is showing up for a fair well.

They are also putting up a rig for their No. 3 on E. A. Delong.

Ballard's No. 5 on Job Smith is in, and is rated at a fifty barrel well.

He is also erecting a rig for his No. 2 on Isaac Pethle.

The Smith Bros. on the C. C. Schanewacker lease are having trouble, as they have had the tools in the hole for more than a week.

The Franshot Bros. well on Long Run was drilled in, and is showing for a ten barrel well, with plenty of gas.

Capt. McLaughlin has the rig up for a well on the Rodney Reynolds farm on Long Run, and ought to be drilling next week.

The latest reports are that the Bettman & Watson well on the L. C. Shingleton farm near Hebron is good for 125 barrels per day.

Everything is ready to begin drilling the Barnsdall & Reynolds well on Rock Run, and work will begin next week.

Mallory Bros. are down some 1500 feet with Hamilton No. 2 on Whiskey Run.

They have also contracted to drill a well on the McCosh farm, a part of the old Crawley place, at the head of the run.

Billy Graham is pulling the casing out of the Wiley School House well, preparatory to hunting a new location.

He now has eleven strings of tools running, and it keeps him moving to look after them.

Both the Wallace and the Barnsdall wells which have been drilling on Alum Cave run of French Creek are reported dry in the Cow Run sand.

The R. S. Reynolds well on Middle Island got a nice show of oil at 985 feet and was shot Tuesday afternoon, filling up with oil. Forty barrels were sand pumped out of her on Wednesday without exhausting the oil. The well will be tubed while tankage is being erected, and it is thought it will then flow, as there is considerable gas. It will probably make a 15 to 20 barrel well. This well is owned by Parkersburg people.

Dr. Gale will at once begin putting up a rig for his No. 2 on C. W. Bills some 400 feet down the Thoroughfare from No. 1, and nearly opposite the Reynolds well.

The Scott & Davis well at Highland on the W. H. Hamilton farm is down some 1300 feet, with five hundred feet of rope, a string of tools, and a set of fishing tools in the hole.

Mr. Haskell, of Bradford, Pa., who is operating here with L. H. Ballard, arrived in town on Thursday. He will be here a week or more.

Ballard & Haskell No. 1 on Cornell, in the Broad Run field, is down some 400 feet, and ought to get the sand the first of the week.

Fraser Bros., who drilled the Wallace well on Alum Cave run, will move their tools to Middle Island creek, where they will drill a well on the C. W. Bailey farm.

It is reported that Ballard & Haskell will put up a rig at once on their McKim territory below Johnstown. We hope they may strike it rich.—Oracle.

**OUR CONGRESSIONAL VISITORS**

Arrive on the Sabbath, and are Conducted About the City in State.

The steamer Virginia and its precious load of human freight, including several Congressmen and their wives and daughters, came down the Ohio yesterday afternoon, as per the programme. The party left Pittsburgh Saturday morning about 10 o'clock, and at every point along their route an ovation of greater or less magnitude was tendered them.

A delegation from this city went up to Wheeling and enjoyed the hospitality of the business men of that city. Our delegation took with them Arnold's orchestra which helped to enliven the occasion.

Arrived in Marietta the Congressmen and a number of the ladies in the party were taken in charge, and shown around the city in hacks. They took a good long look at the Ice Harbor lot, and said that if the U. S. could get a clear title to the property a building for Government use would in all probability be erected upon the site.

After a stop of about an hour the party boarded the boat and in a short time were off for Parkersburg, where they left the river and went east to Washington.

It is practically determined by the Committee that a preliminary survey along the lines suggested by Col. Stickle, will be asked for. The probable cost of the cost of the improvement is figured at \$25,000,000.


