IN THE OIL FIELDS.
Sistersville, W. Va., April 1.—The
outlook in the Indian Creek field is a
little brighter today than it has been
for several days. The Devonian Oil
Company's No. 1, on the Joseph Spencer
farm, struck a small flow of oil last
evening and during the night it made
between 75 and 100 barrels. The well
will be drilled deeper in the hope of
increasing the production.

The same company's well on the John
Sickman farm will not, it is now be-
lieved, make as good a showing as the
well on the Spencer farm. Judging
from the present indications, this well
probably will make in the neighborhood of
50 barrels a day when connected up.

The Devonian Oil Company's well on
the Ash farm seems to be the smallest of
the three. No figure has been given
on its probable production, more than
it will be quite small.

Unless some of the other wells in the
immediate neighborhood of these wells
make a better showing than these wells
have made it is feared that the field
will prove far below what it has been
considered to be and what it has been
backed for by people holding leases in
that section.

Ceredo, W. Va., April 1.—News re-
ached here to-day that Shaw & Rose, of
Lima, O., have been drilling for oil in
Marrowbone creek, this county, have
been successful and that oil was re-
ached at a depth of about 1,500 feet. Con-
siderable excitement prevails here, as
several parties lying in this neighbor-
hood own land in that region.

Roeser & Best's Nazum No. 9 at Corn-
ing filled up 1,000 feet with oil Wed-
nesday night. It was shot Thursday
morning and is reported good for 100
barrels per day. The big gasser struck
by the same company on the Latta
lease last week, was shot with 100
quarts of glycerine and makes 10 bar-
rels. Roeser & Best have now six new
rigs up, two on the Latta heirs, two
on Fisher and two on Nazum, and
three strings of tools are now running.

The well on the W. P. Hays farm is
drilling. Should this prove to be a
good well a large number will be
drilled opposite town.—[New Mata-
moras Mail.]

The South Penn Oil Co. has leased a
scope of country in the vicinity of Mur-
phytown since our last writing, and
things seem to be on the move. The
rig is being built on the Newbank's
farm, and others are located on the
Richardson and Hendershot farms a
few miles from the metropolis of Mur-
phytown.

The bad roads still exist in the oil
fields and developments are greatly
handicapped thereby. One teamster
relates that in many places the mud is
deep enough to reach the collars of the
horses and that a few days recently he
went into a hole with a load of sup-
plies, the bed of the wagon resting on
the top of the mud.

The Schnauffer & Berry well which
came in Wednesday at Long Run, is
a good one, reported to be the best in
that field.

Not a Store Left.
ROME, N. Y., April 2.—At 1:30 Thurs-
day morning fire broke out in the store
of W. H. Stewart, in Oriskanna Falls,
and destroyed \$50,000 worth of prop-
erty. The amount of insurance has not
been figured up. There is not a store
left in the village. The cause of the
fire is unknown.

Sues Out a Writ of Habeas Corpus.
RICHMOND, Va., April 2.—Counsel for
the managers of St. Asaph race track
near Alexandria, who were arrested for
violating the Maupin law, sued out a
writ of habeas corpus in the supreme
court of appeals Thursday morning.
The writ was made returnable May 9.

Encamped Near Suakin.
LONDON, April 2.—A dispatch to the
Central News from Cairo says that the
Dervishes, under Osman Azrak, are ad-
vancing upon Suada and another
force of Dervishes is advancing upon
Abu Fatme. Osman Digna is en-
camped 30 miles from Suakin.

CINCINNATI, O., April 2.—Frank Al-
kire, the well-known marksman, shot
and killed a large gray eagle on the
Owens farm, near this city, Wednesday
morning. It measured six feet between
the tips of its wings.

Terrible Fall.
POMEROY, O., April 2.—Late Tuesday
night W. H. Ewing was hoisting pota-
toes from his cellar into the third-
story of his building, the elevator rope
broke, and he fell a distance of about
25 feet. He will die.

Section 1. Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Marietta, Ohio, that the grade of Fourth Street in said city be and the same is hereby established as follows: the figures here-
in after appearing indicating the number of feet above the established datum of base line at which the grade at the point designated is hereby fixed, as the easterly and westerly curbs, respectively, of said Fourth Street—
