A REVOLUTION.
Entire City Government Changed
at Monday's Election.

Meisenhelder, Mason and Richards
Win Out Easily.

Big Surprise All Around.—City Council
Republican, Dr. McClure Being the
Only Member Re-elected.
Heaviest Vote in the
City's History.

Over 3400 votes were cast at the
municipal election Monday, the largest
number ever known.

Mayor Palmer was deposed, Solicitor
Brenan was deposed, Engineer Gates
was deposed, as was also every Coun-
cilman up for re-election, with the ex-
ception of Dr. McClure, who had no
opposition.

The people evidently wanted a
change—voted for it—and got it.

Monday was an ideal election day
and in point of numbers voting the
election itself was an ideal one. It be-
came apparent soon after noon that the
total vote would be far in excess of
that ever cast at any previous spring
election. Dozens of cabs and scores of
ward workers were busy all day in the
interest of various candidates. The
contest took on the quiet, strained
aspect of a close and deadly battle.

The chief interest settled, of course,
about the contest for Mayor, and each
of the three candidates used his utmost
exertions to get out every vote possible.
For City Engineer and Solicitor the
race was also interesting and well run.
For member of Board of Education
there were several more candidates
than required and for that reason the
contest did not assume the same fight-
ing proportions as for other offices.
Everybody conceded the re-election of
Prof. Andrews and the rest of the can-
didates fought for second place.

The women's vote was very light
falling short of last years in every ward
and precinct.
