IN THE OIL FIELDS.

One of the most important strikes in the Marietta field was that made Thursday at Cutler, west of the city. The well is a genuine wild-cat and in the Berea sand. Upon being drilled one foot into the sand it gushed forth salt water and oil almost over the derrick, the gas pressure being very heavy. Tankage has been ordered to be erected immediately, after which the well will be drilled in.

It is located on Mrs. Riley's farm, part of a 1000-acre tract under lease by the Thompson Oil Company, which is composed entirely of Toledo railway men. Adjoining it is a 1000-acre lease belonging to Tom Riley and N. W. Musgrave and also a 1000-acre lease belonging to Tom Riley alone.

The opening up of a Berea field at Cutler places Marietta in the very center of what is certain to be the biggest and most productive field in the country when fully developed. The value of the well, even though it prove to be not a large producer, is, from a commercial standpoint, almost inestimable.

The lease on 100 acres on the Jacob Schill farm in the Big Kate field, owned by Parker & Duke and Deem & Berry, was sold yesterday by Constable Fox, in front of the court house on an order of sale issued by Justice Jones, to satisfy a judgment of \$800 in favor of Judge McCluer, for legal services. The lease was purchased by Otto Lehman for \$326.50. We are informed that the purchase was made for the owners, who believe the lease is a valuable one.—Sentinel.

Patrick O'Brien, who owns 300 acres of land about two miles east of the Ogden well has leased his land for oil purposes. At least a hundred people have been after the lease for several months, but could not come to terms with him. He would name a price, but when it was offered he would raise it and the consequence was that no one could strike a bargain with him. He was independent, however, and held out until yesterday, when he leased. It might be stated that he received what he asked, \$5,000 bonus and a big rental. The deal was closed Thursday afternoon and the purchaser is Barney Forest, one of the big operators in the leading fields.

Ellenboro, W. Va., April 23.—The Davis & Scott well at Highland is reported dry in the Big Injun sand, but is to be drilled to the Berea grit, provided the land owners will remit one month's rental and all have agreed. The Strickler Oil Company commenced their No. 2 yesterday and will begin No. 3 on the old Crawley farm as soon as machinery is secured.

Barnsdall & Mallory's Hamilton No. 2, on Whisky Run, has a fishing job, but is making ten barrels a day from the Big Injun sand, and nothing from the Keener.

Another lucky strike was made on the Shingleton farm near Hebron, yesterday, and the well is reported doing eight barrels an hour in the Cow Run sand. This is the third well in this locality and all are doing about the same in the Cow Run sand. Much drilling will be done in this section, as but one dry hole has as yet been drilled in the Hebron district.

Parkersburg, W. Va., April 23.—Hall & Reece, of Lima, Ohio, got a fine showing of oil in a red sand in their well in Wayne county, W. Va., a few miles north of the Big Sandy river, at the depth of 1,500 feet. The fluid found is of a yellowish green cast and is 35 gravity. The strike is a new sand formation entirely, and does not correspond to the well-recognized strata in any way whatever.

The casing will be drawn and the hole abandoned on the Kennedy farm adjoining the Drake well in the Waverly field.

A well in the Calf Creek field which was worked for some time as a mystery, and is known as the Angus well, promises to be a good producer.

Cairo, W. Va., April 23.—Two wells will be drilled in this week by the Cairo Oil Company, on the Yockey and Weaver farms.

The well on the Lee farm, known as the Clark well, has struck a good gas pressure.

The Henry Oil Company have a fine block of leases near Cornwallis and have let the contract for a rig on the lease.

A report comes here that a dry hole has been struck on the Henderson farm near Meadville, Tyler county, and also a good well on the same farm.
