

—Bike owners had better have a care to see that their "horses" are locked up securely at night; for we know that there are thieves abroad, with a particularly strong liking for safeties. One was stolen a few nights ago from a porch on a prominent street, and the owner now goes sadly afoot.

—D. M. O'Brien has resigned his position as reporter on the Register and will go to Parkersburg next Tuesday to do similar duty on the State Journal. His position on the Register will be taken by Laurence Dana.

—In Squire Guyton's court Friday a warrant was issued for the arrest of Frederick Losshe on the charge of failure to support a minor child.

—Joseph O'Conner has been appointed agent of the B. & O. S. W. at Constitution, vice S. A. Coffman resigned.

—Tuesday evening, April 23rd, the High School Orchestra and Senior class will run a moonlight excursion up the Ohio on the steamer Barnsdall.

—The first game of base ball of the season to be played this afternoon between the College team and the Lobdells promises to be a closely contested one. Both teams have shown up well in practice and an interesting game is promised. As this is the first game, the boys have reduced the price of admission to ten cents; ladies free.

—The remains of W. E. Hays, who died at the County Infirmary Wednesday night and was buried Thursday, were disinterred on Friday to be taken to his old home at Fairplains for permanent burial.

—At the quarterly meeting of the Washington County Medical Society, held Friday at the office of Dr. Cotton, the following officers were elected for the ensuing year: Dr. Eddy, President; Dr. James Hardy, of Whipple, Vice President; Dr. John McClure, Secretary and Treasurer.

—The recently organized base ball team at Parkersburg will cross bats with the Mariettas about May 1st.

—The S. D. Hart lot on the corner of Warren and Fourth streets was sold Friday through J. A. Plumer & Son to Charles Heidrick for \$1700. Mr. Heidrick will build on the lot immediately.

—The stone pillars which are to carry the steel frame of the big boiler works building, will be finished next week, ready for the trusswork to proceed.

—The Marietta Hardware Co., West Side, have added the tinning business to their establishment, having opened up a shop yesterday. Messrs. Hall and Morgan, of Caldwell, are in charge, and are in the room recently occupied by Henry Remeley.

—Clarence Stephens, of New York, who is interested in the Marietta Run Coal and Coke Company, was in the city on business Friday. The company have a strike on their hands among the miners at Utley.

—Miss May Riley is home from Parkersburg to spend Sunday.

—Mrs. L. H. Brown, of Belpre, was in the city Friday.

—Dr. and Mrs. A. J. Butler, of Coopersburg, N. Y., are guests of their cousin, Mr. F. S. Turner.

—The little friends of Edwin Alderman, the oldest son of Mr. and Mrs. Earl Alderman, Fourth street, were asked in yesterday afternoon, to help celebrate the young man's sixth birthday.

—Miss Julia L. Taylor, sister of Seymour Taylor, is quite ill with rheumatism.

—G. B. Sunderland, the real estate agent, sold the J. H. Schramm property on Warren street Thursday, to B. A. Moses, for the sum of \$2,050.

—The Sunday School Convention to be held in the Baptist Church next Tuesday and Wednesday will be an important gathering. Mr. Marion Lawrence, of Toledo, will speak both evenings and during the day, and there will be many other good features. Let everyone attend.

—Mr. M. V. Penwell is ill at his home with fever.

—Mr. H. A. Wagner, the "Mantel Man" has recently made some very important changes in the arrangement of his workshop. He has moved it from the lot it has occupied for years, to the rear of his show room. The shop is elevated, so that the ground floor may be used for storing heavy stuff, and it is all far enough away from his show room to insure against fire. The improvement gives Mr. Wagner many facilities which will admit of an increase in his business.

—The heavy storm that passed south of Marietta Friday afternoon is reported to have struck Sistersville in all its fury. We are informed that lightning struck several derricks, which were burned.

—The members of Augusta Lodge No. 272, Daughters of Rebecca, are requested to meet at the lodge room on Front street, at 10 a. m., sun time, next Sunday, for the purpose of attending services at the First M. E. church.

—W. J. Burkhart left Friday for Huntington to build rigs for a couple of wildcat wells that will be put down at once.

—The latest report Friday evening from the bedside of Ed Best was to the effect that he was considerably improved.

—The infant daughter of Mr. and Mrs. N. T. Burkhart, who died Thursday night, was buried Friday, the funeral taking place from the house.

—C. N. Jackson, a traveling photographer, is wanted in this city for obtaining money by false pretenses. While waiting for a train in the union depot he left with Mr. Hennis, the agent of the U. S. Express Co., a number of pictures of the house of Baggage Master J. L. Toller, representing to Mr. Hennis that Toller had ordered them. Hennis gave him the \$1.50 he claimed to be due for the pictures, but discovered when Mr. Toller came from his run that the scheme was a fraud. Toller had not ordered the pictures, he paid Mr. Hennis the \$1.50 he was out and immediately swore out a warrant for Jackson's arrest. The chief of police at Zanesville, wither Jackson went, has been telegraphed to arrest him.

—Jerome McCormick, of Independence township, whose arrest on the charge of breaking into the house of James Fox in the day time has been chronicled in the Leader, had a hearing before Squire Richards Friday afternoon and was bound over to court. His bond was fixed at \$300, and being unable to give it was sent to jail.

—Wallace Ritchie, who was arrested on the charge of stealing chickens, will have a hearing at the Court House today before Justice Palmer. Attorney B. E. Guyton will appear for the prosecution. A part of the evidence to be offered by the State is a large number of chicken heads found buried in the ground at Ritchie's home.

—In Probate Court Friday an inquest of lunacy was held upon Miss Nettie Eichmiller, of Watertown township, whose disappearance from the home of her mother was noted in the Leader several days ago. Having recently been an inmate of Longview Asylum it was necessary that she be readjudged insane in order to be committed to the hospital at Athens. She will be taken to that institution today.

—There are several passenger coaches now in the Chillicothe shops, undergoing repairs, among them a train for the Marietta branch. It will be finished in about a month, and put into service, giving genial conductor Lord the opportunity of displaying his buttons to the best advantage.—Sentinel.

—Sheldon Dye, of the West Side, was arrested by Marshal Parlin Friday on an old charge of disorderly conduct. It will be remembered that young Dye was to have been tried before ex-Mayor Palmer recently, and the jury demanded had been secured, when the defendant failed to show up at the hour set. He will be tried before Mayor Meisenholder today.

—The citizens of Parkersburg were shocked Thursday night by the death of Camden Rathbone, which occurred about 9 o'clock. He was stricken with heart disease and fell on the street. He was 34 years of age and leaves a wife and one child.

—At last the misty and foggy atmosphere surrounding the disappearance of Arthur Dickerson on the evening preceding the day of his marriage is clearing up, leaving nothing to his credit. We are reliably informed that his sister, Mrs. Curry, of near Watertown, received a letter the first of the week from his brother living in Zanesville, stating that upon his returning to his home after being called here on account of the supposed murder of his brother, he found him at his house and the letter also stated not to worry further concerning his safety. This information comes to us from such reliable source that there can be little doubt of its truth.—Beverly Dispatch.

—A traveling insurance agent giving the name of Warden Sheets was arrested at Parkersburg Friday on the charge of jumping a board bill at Petroleum.

—Miss Agnes P. Browning accompanied her brother Thomas to his home at Pentwater, Michigan, on Tuesday, where she will remain at least a year. It is hoped that the change will divert her mind from the scenes and gossip coupled with the unfortunate outcome of her prospective marriage to Arthur Dickerson, who mysteriously disappeared two days before the affair was to have been consummated. Her brother Ed and a cousin also reside at Pentwater.—Beverly Advance.
