

—Mr. R. C. Dawes, of this city, has been appointed by Governor Bushnell as a member of the Commission to prepare for the Ohio Centennial celebration in 1903. The Commission consists of seven members and was provided for by joint resolution. The Governor is especially fortunate in his appointment of Mr. Dawes as a member from Southeastern Ohio, as he is a gentleman who has given no little time and study to the history of Ohio's statehood and is eminently qualified for the position.

—Buell Post G. A. R. will hold a Camp Fire at their room on Putnam street Thursday evening, April 30th. Department Commander Chas. Townsend G. A. R. of Ohio will be present to address the comrades. All Grand Army men are invited to be present.

—The grand jury for the May term of court meets next Tuesday. The criminal docket will be very light this term.

A Mortgage, But No Good.

The St. Louis Chronicle of the 23d instant contains the following: "The managers of the Laclade Wagon and Car Company of 1403 North Broadway are looking for the "Latest Invention of the Age" and incidentally for a big red wagon belonging to them valued at \$85.

The following advertisement in Wednesday night's Chronicle partly explains what the wagon company wants: LIBERAL REWARDS Offered for information of man named Schrader, and wife, Annie, operating a phonograph in wagon lettered on sides, "Latest Invention of the Age, Edison Phonograph," supposed to be in Missouri working the river towns; telegraph information at our expense to Laclade Wagon and Car Company, 1403 N. Broadway, St. Louis, Mo.

About seven months ago the man Schrader called at the office of the wagon company and "purchased" a wagon for \$85, giving in security a mortgage on some land in Marietta, Ohio.

Monday when the Laclade people attempted to foreclose the mortgage they found that the Schraders had not owned the property for over a year, hence the ad."

Kentucky Oil Deal.

RICHMOND, Ky., April 26.—A company composed of James M. Nave and L. C. Drake, of Nicholasville, and T. B. Siter, of Williamsburg, has been organized at the former place for the development of oil lands in Central Kentucky. They have already leased about 7,000 acres in Rockcastle, Garrard and Madison Counties, and are negotiating for other large tracts. As soon as they secure 10,000 acres they will commence sinking wells. It is believed that oil exists in paying quantities in all three of these counties, though this is the first attempt ever made to find it.


