IN THE OIL FIELDS.

Parkersburg, W. Va., May 24.—The South Penn Oil Company have located a well on the John J. Jackson farm, about three miles north of this city, and will commence drilling as soon as preparations can be made. The location is far ahead of present developments and if the well proves a good strike Parkersburg can well be called the oil center of the State.

The lease purchased a week ago by Stiles, the Volcano oil king, from Indiana parties for \$700, and which is in the midst of Ogdin developments and known as the Hendershot, will be developed immediately and he is erecting a rig for that purpose.

The drill will be started Wednesday for a well on the McAtee farm in the Big Run field, by the 96 Oil Company, of Marietta, O. In the same field a dry well was struck after being shot, by Altbey & Davis, in their No. 4, Friday. On the Way farm a ten-barrel well was struck after the shot, by Messrs. Buehley & Bizarant, and not over twenty-five rods from the Abbey No. 1 in the same field. A well will be started drilling to-morrow by Kelly & Kennedy.

The Greiner Oil Company's well on Way's farm, a shallow sand venture, which was tied up by an accident just as the drill was entering the sand, will be drilled in to-morrow.

Drilling on the South Fork Oil Company's well at Manganese, this county, is now progressing slowly, the well caving almost continuously and giving its owners a deal of trouble.

The oil market dropped to \$1.10 Monday and it is now generally believed by oil men that the price will go down to one dollar.

John T. Hutchison Married. In the Cincinnati Enquirer of Monday, the 25th appeared a telegram from St. Augustine, Florida, as follows: St. Augustine, Fla., May 24.—John T. Hutchison, of Marietta, Ohio, and Mrs. Georgiana Allen were married here last night. Mr. Hutchison is nearly 80 years old and is said to be wealthy. Mrs. Allen is about 70 and is the widow of John Allen, for years prominent in this city's politics. Mrs. Allen also has considerable property. John Allen died a few months ago.

Shortly after his death the widow inserted a "Husband wanted" advertisement in a Western paper. Mr. Hutchison answered the ad. and a correspondence ensued. It was finally agreed that he should come here, and if, on inspection, the widow liked him, marriage would follow. Mr. Hutchison arrived late yesterday afternoon.

The widow met him at the depot and after scanning him closely through her glasses, said: "You'll do." The couple then proceeded to the Courthouse and secured a license. They then called in the Rev. Mr. Wiggins, who, at 8 o'clock, made them man and wife. Although very old, they are seemingly as frisky as young folks.

ARMY AND NAVY. The battle ship Massachusetts is expected to exceed contract requirements as to speed. England pays her private soldiers 2 1/4 times as much as Germany, with 3 1/2 times as much retired pay and pensions.

During the most peaceful years the world has 3,700,000 soldiers. The pay, equipments, food and clothing of these men cost nearly \$2,500,000 a day. Nearly every English flagship carries eight and every cruiser four fully qualified divers, whose duty it is to repair any damage sustained by the vessel below the water line, clearing the propellers and recovering the anchors.
