

DARING FEATS

Performed on Horseback by the Cadets at West Point.

The Graduation Season at the Famous Military Academy.

The Cavalry Drill Said to be the Finest Ever Witnessed Upon the Plain—Several of the Cadets Were Injured—Examinations Progressing Slowly.

WEST POINT, N. Y., June 3.—There was very little to interest the spectators here Tuesday until the cavalry drill at 5 o'clock Tuesday evening.

The examinations are progressing slowly. Tuesday morning the third and fourth classes were examined in mathematics, the first class in engineering and Spanish and Tuesday afternoon the second class in chemistry.

At 4:45 o'clock Tuesday afternoon there was a cavalry drill upon the plain which was participated in by all the members of the first-class excepting Cadets Hinkley and Nolan, who were excused on account of disability.

Three years of persistent training has developed the lads into accomplished horsemen, and the feats performed Tuesday afternoon were thrilling as well as interesting. During one of the exciting charges Cadet Morrison's horse fell with him, and the lad sustained some slight injuries.

He courageously remounted his steed, however, and continued the drill.

Cadet England's horse also became uncontrollable and ran away, and Cadet Tupe's horse was injured in the charge and had to be retired. Notwithstanding these casualties there was not a hitch in the drill, which is said to be the finest ever witnessed on the plain.

He stated to friends that he would not permit his name to be presented to the republican national convention regardless of the fact that the Kentucky delegates at large and some of the district delegates are instructed for him.

Want Capt. Wiborg Pardoned.

WASHINGTON, June 3.—Congressman Woodman, of Chicago, has secured the signature of 48 senators and 180 representatives to the petition addressed to the president requesting the pardon of Capt. Wiborg, of the steamship Horsa, who was recently convicted in the United States district court of Pennsylvania for a violation of the neutrality laws.

FOR SILVER.

The Kentucky Democratic State Convention at Lexington.

The Silverites Arrange the Entire Affair to Suit Themselves.

Senator Jo Blackburn is the Hero of the Hour—Talk is Heard About Him for the Presidential Stakes—Convention Held in Chautauqua Auditorium.

LEXINGTON, June 3.—Wednesday was the day of days for the Kentucky democracy. Wednesday morning it was conceded on all sides that Wednesday's democratic state convention would declare for the free and unlimited coinage of gold and silver at the ratio of 16 to 1.

It was definitely settled Tuesday night that State Senator Charles J. Bronston, of Lexington, was to be temporary chairman and Hon. Charles E. Wheeler, of Paducah, permanent chairman.

Fitzhugh Lee Arrives in Havana.

HAVANA, June 3.—Gen. Fitzhugh Lee, who was a few weeks ago appointed United States consul general here to succeed Mr. Ramson O. Williams, arrived here early Wednesday morning on board the steamer Mascotte.

Passed Over the President's Veto.

WASHINGTON, June 3.—The senate passed the river and harbor bill over the president's veto by the necessary two-thirds majority—yeas, 56; nays, 4.

Miners Killed by an Explosion.

PARIS, June 3.—A dispatch from Nimes, in the department of Gard, says that an explosion of gas occurred in the Fontanes mine, near Rochecolombe, Tuesday, killing 26 miners.

ST. LOUIS STORM.

A Corrected List of the Number of Killed, Wounded and Missing.

St. Louis, June 3.—The body of an unknown man was found floating in the river Tuesday. It is believed the man was a victim of last week's tornado. This is the only addition to the death list in the past 24 hours.

Burial permits issued to date, 127; killed, bodies not recovered, 18; wounded in hospitals, 90; missing people, 80; grand total, 310.

The relief fund at ten o'clock Wednesday morning had been increased to \$140,000, and it is expected that at least \$10,000 more will be subscribed before night.
