Fatal Accident.

PARKERSBURG, June 9.—An accident happened this morning on a farm of Judge John J. Jackson, which lies about five miles from town on the back Williamstown road, whereby a derrick workman was killed and two others were injured, but not very badly. An oil derrick was being erected and it was partly constructed. A builder from the neighborhood of Mannington by the name of E. G. Cordray, was at work in the derrick about 18 feet from the floor with Will Headley and another workman whose name we do not know assisting him. There was a cross-board in the derrick on which two of the men were standing, when Headley walked out onto the same board and the weight of the tree was more than the board would sustain and it broke, participating them all to the ground. Cordray fell on the outside, striking on the back of his head and producing concussion of the brain causing his death in about a half hour afterwards. Headley fell on the inside of the derrick and was hurt pretty badly, but not seriously. The unknown party received no injuries worth speaking of.


