

—The steamer “Honsell” ran her  
 tow of steel rails on the head of New-  
 bury Island on Wednesday morning,  
 but got them afloat without damage.  
 —An Epworth League picnic will be  
 held at Fountain Park July 23d. An  
 excellent program has been prepared  
 which will appear later. Every body  
 in any way interested in young peo-  
 ple's christian organizations is invited  
 to be present.  
 —The team today against Nelson-  
 ville will be as follows: Donahue c,  
 Reynolds p, Shiers 1b, Hutchins 2b,  
 Caskey 3b, Legge ss, McCammon lf,  
 Brown cf, McCallister rf. Klintworth  
 and Blanchard on the bench. The new  
 men, Hutchins and Legge, are from  
 Springfield and come highly recom-  
 mended for their positions as well as  
 hitters and base runners. We look for  
 much better results today. The new  
 men will positively appear.

 June 30th, after a protracted illness.  
 The deceased was 70 years of age and  
 well known. Funeral Thursday.

 credit for establishing unaided one of  
 the largest industries in Marietta, has  
 leased the middle building of the Law-  
 rence Piano Works and will occupy it  
 as a factory for the manufacture of  
 wooden handle bars for bicycles. The  
 deal has been on for several weeks and  
 Mr. Lobdell has been in the east per-  
 forming arrangements for starting the  
 enterprise, the success of which is as-  
 sured by his presence at the head of it.

—Mr. George R. Goddard, of Fairfield,  
 was in the city on business Wednesday.  
 —Deputy Sheriff William Gearhart,  
 of Waverly, entered James Rowen's sal-  
 oon, at Waverly, Sunday morning,  
 early, and when he attempted to put  
 some of the men in the place under ar-

 him badly. While it is not thought

 is in a very bad shape. No arrest has
