

The trial of Mr. Archimedes Calvert, of Warren township, on an affidavit charging lunacy, occupied the entire day before Probate Judge Rood Tuesday. The inquest was held in the Common Pleas court room and a large crowd was present to hear the testimony. Many witnesses were examined.

Squire B. E. Guyton appearing for the State and attorneys Leeper and Hathaway for Mr. Calvert. The court found the defendant not insane and he was discharged Tuesday evening. The evidence was of a sensational nature and showed a bad state of affairs existing in the neighborhood of the Mile Run Christian church, where Mr. Calvert formerly preached. A very bitter feeling had grown up between Mr. Calvert and his neighbors and he and his family have been ostracised for several years. Recently the trouble grew to such serious proportions that several residents of the neighborhood, including Mr. Calvert, went armed and it was after he had fired at persons trespassing on his premises that the affidavit charging insanity was filed by Mr. Wilson Sprague. In discharging the defendant, Judge Rood delivered him a lecture on the danger of a man of hasty temper carrying firearms. Many persons, while not doubting Mr. Calvert's sanity, entertain fears that the trouble will continue until it results seriously.

The Knights of Pythias, of Elba, are at work on the erection of their new building in the south end of town. The structure will have a stone foundation and will be built above of tile expressly made for laying up walls. The size of the building is to be 30x50, two stories high, and it will have a hall on both first and second floors, the first floor hall to be used as a town hall and the second floor as a lodge room for the Knights of Pythias.

A Hercules bicycle was stolen Monday night from the curbstone in front of Platt's bakery. The wheel was numbered 58,875, with H. & W. saddle, M. & W. tires, 24 in. frame, rat trap pedals, rams horn handle bars and Plymouth rims. Five dollars reward will be paid for its recovery.

During an altercation on Marion street Tuesday night between the families of David Newton and Frank D. Devoil, the former was struck on the hip with a hammer in the hands of Mrs. Devoil and severely wounded. Immediately afterward, he alleges, he was shot at by Devoil. Newton called special officer Chas. Weyrich and had Devoil placed under arrest, but the latter was released upon the bond of Chas. Elston, by whom he is employed as a miller. Later Newton became frightened at the possibility of being again assaulted and swore out a warrant before Mayor Palmer, charging the offense of shooting with intent to kill. Devoil was locked up by Marshal Parlin at midnight and will have a hearing today. It is said that bad blood has existed between the two families for some time.

COUNCIL PROCEEDING. Council met in regular session Tuesday evening with nine members present.

The application of S. H. Neece for a position as inspector of material on the Third street paving job was referred to the Paving Committee.

The matter of reported encroachment on the commons and stone quarry lots on the West Side, was referred to the Street Committee, City Engineer and City Solicitor.

The opening and grading of Marion street was referred to the Street Committee.

The ordinance assessing the cost of Second street paving upon the owners of abutting property from Ohio to Butler streets, was submitted with some slight amendments and adopted.

The Engineer's report of the total cost of Greene street paving from Second to Fourth, showing the amount to have been \$4,552.90, was read by the Clerk and referred to the Solicitor to prepare the necessary assessment ordinance.

The City Engineer reported having made a survey of Franklin street with a view to sewer improvement, making the main outlet at the foot of that street. The matter was continued for conference with the sewer committee and further report.

The grading of Fifth and Montgomery streets, at their intersection, was referred to the Street Committee, City Commissioner and City Engineer.

A resolution requiring the construction of an 8 foot brick sidewalk on Second street from the National Supply Co. store to the C. & M. depot, was adopted.

The proposed opening of Charles street, through to the Pike was referred to the Street committee, to ascertain the cost of land necessary to be purchased for the improvement.

The usual number of bills were allowed and Council adjourned.
