

PERSONAL AND LOCAL.

—Mrs. W. E. Dye, of McConnellsville, is in Marietta, in attendance upon her mother, who is being treated for cancer.

—One hundred and sixty members of the Beverly Presbyterian Sabbath school came down on the Sonoma Wednesday morning and picnicked in this city. The rain dampened their enthusiasm somewhat, but they nevertheless spent the day in an enjoyable manner.

—The advance advertising car of John Robinson's circus arrived in the city Wednesday and the bill posters were busy covering the large area of boards erected for the purpose.

—Mr. M. G. Geider, of the National Supply Company, Pittsburg, is in the city on business.

—In Probate Court Friday a marriage license was issued to Abel Addison and Madge M. Weed, both of Marietta.

—Wednesday morning James Rice made a sensational attempt at suicide while confined in the city prison. He hacked his throat and wrists in a shocking manner with a pocket knife and bled profusely. The wounds were not serious, however, and were dressed by Dr. Charles S. Hart. Rice was imprisoned several days ago, having a bad case of delirium tremens at the time. He was better Tuesday and was allowed to walk about the streets. It is supposed that he secured the knife while at liberty and secreted it in his cell for the purpose to which he applied it. He remained mentally unbalanced during Wednesday and made several attempts to tear away the bandages. Rice is an oil man and has been boarding at the LaBelle hotel. He has had delirium tremens several times before and is in a serious condition.

—The Young People's Society of the Lowell Baptist Church will give an ice-cream and cake social at the home of Mr. and Mrs. M. A. Longley, Saturday evening, July 25th. All are invited.

—The Zanesville bicycle club will hold a race meet on Labor Day, a feature of which will be a road race from Dayton to Zanesville and a fancy parade. The affair will wind up with a grand ball in the evening.

—The Zanesville Times Recorder says: "Manager Mercer is contemplating some needed changes with a view to strengthening the club and making it the best in the state. Along this line negotiations are pending for the signing of Lowry, Chillicothe's crack pitcher, and Taylor, of the Marietta club, who has made a great record as a pitcher.

—Mr. Archimedes Calvert called in Wednesday, and asked that we make a correction of our statement to the effect that he was armed with a pistol and knives. —The heavy rainstorm of Tuesday did great damage in West Virginia. The Sentinel says: The Kanawha river is bank full and in places has overflowed the bottom land destroying a large amount of wheat in shock and badly damaging the corn crops. The valleys of the smaller tributary streams have been nearly all swept from hill to hill and nearly everything in the way of growing crops washed away or badly damaged. Worthington, Stillwell, Walkers and Goose Creeks and the north forks of Hughes River have been higher than they have been for several years and their strong currents have swept their bottoms of fences, crops and small buildings. Houses have been flooded and the inmates obliged to move out and there are a number of unauthenticated rumors of houses being washed completely away. No lives have as yet been reported lost, but the damage to property will amount to thousands of dollars and many persons by the destruction of their crops have had their principal means of subsistence and food supply for the coming winter destroyed.

—The terrific rains of Tuesday night did great damage along the line of the B. & O. S. W. railroad between Parkersburg and Grafton. St. Louis, July 20.—Ever since the Chicago convention, the friends of Hon. R. P. Bland have been persistent in their demands that he become the democratic candidate for governor of Missouri, but he has steadily refused and stated that he wished to return to congress. To set the matter at rest Mr. Bland sent the following telegram to a local democratic leader:

"No one is authorized to use my name for governor. As stated over and over again, I would not accept the nomination. I am not in the habit of lying about an important matter like this. If the convention should nominate me over my protest, it would have its work to do over again. I would not accept it."
