

The funeral of the four-months-old child of Mr. and Mrs. William Gilpin, which died of cholera infantum Thursday afternoon, occurred Friday.

Marshal Parlin went to Elba Friday morning to arrest Howard and Harry Waller and Shult. Harlow on warrants charging them with assault with intent to kill. The trio are the fellows who beat young Gildow recently, the details of which event were published in the Leader. When the Marshal arrived at Elba he found that they had skipped to avoid punishment.

An unusual and fatal epidemic apparently combining typhoid fever and grip, is raging at Baersville, up the Ohio. There are at present 37 cases. Three persons have already died and three others are not expected to live. Among the first to succumb was second clerk Forrest Baer, of the Ben Bar, who died Wednesday and was buried Friday.

Marietta lost Friday's game at Sistersville by a score of 5 to 1, the poor showing being mainly due to errors of infield players. Blough and Donahue were the battery for Marietta and the Sistersvillians secured but nine hits off the new man's delivery. McIlwaine pitched for Sistersville and held Marietta down to eight hits. Fireman Frank Jackson, of the C. & M., has been confined to the house by illness.

Harry L. Robinson, a well known and popular brakeman on the O. R. R. was instantly killed Thursday night at Franklin, a short distance above Clarington. Robinson was on No. 12 local south bound freight train. At Franklin there is a bridge crossing the creek. About the time the train was entering the bridge Robinson started to climb up the side ladder on an L. & N. car and was struck by the bridge and knocked into the creek below.—Sentinel.

On her down trip Thursday the Liberty backed into the bank a short distance below Wheeling and broke her cylinder rudder which deceived the pilot. The boat managed to get in here Thursday afternoon nearly 24 hours behind time. Capt. Booth will either put her on the docks here or take her to Middleport and dock her. A new rudder which was made some time ago for her at this place will also be put on and general repairs made. She will not be ready for service again for several weeks.—Sentinel.


Presbyterian—Morning subject, "The Standard of Moral Values." In the evening Dr. Gear will preach.
