All of this is payable to Mrs. Rumpf, excepting \$500, which goes to his son, Edward. Mr. Frank Hoffman carried \$1,500 in the Standard, payable to his wife, while Fireman Geo. W. Thompson also carried a policy for \$1,500 in the Travelers', which policy is made payable to his brother in Columbus, in case of death. Wm. 
#### Mary Suicide.
