Commissioners' Proceedings.

From the Journal of the County Auditor we take the following report of the work of the County Commissioners at their last session:

A bond in the sum of \$100,000 was presented by G. J. Lund in his capacity as County Treasurer, with Flora F. Lund, J. W. Stanley, Charles Jones, J. S. Simpson, W. H. Styer, Charles Penrose, M. F. Noll, T. W. Moore and W. W. Mills as sureties, and was approved.

County Surveyor Levi Bartlett's bond in the sum of \$2,000, with J. G. Barker, F. H. Bartlett and C. M. Devol as sureties, was also presented and approved.

An examination of the funds in the county treasury showed the sum of \$46,358.83 belonging to the county therein.

In the matter of the petition of N. C. Cisher and others for the establishment of a county road in Ludlow and Grandview townships, Luther Rinard, Luther Price and James Anderson were appointed viewers.

Contracts for building a bridge across Lane's Run and repairing the Mackey bridge at \$115 and \$38 for the two jobs respectively, were awarded to T. B. Snyder.

The annual report of the Infirmary Directors was approved. Number of inmates of the infirmary, males 36, females 63, total 99. Number September 1, '95, 93. Number dying during the year 10.

B. B. Stone reported that there was \$38,952.45 in the County Treasurer's hands belonging to Marietta City, \$3,308.41 to the credit of the Trustees of the Water Works, and \$39.67 to the credit of the Ministerial Trustees.

The annual report of the Trustees of the Children's Home showed the expenditures for the year to have been \$6,133.99.

In the matter of the petition of T. J. Conner et al for the alteration of a county road in Fearing and Lawrence townships, compensation and damages were allowed as follows: J. J. House, \$5.00; T. B. The petitions of J. N. Pegg and others for the establishment of a county road in Newport township, and of J. M. Walker and others for the vacation of a road in Grandview township, were continued for further consideration at the next regular session.

In the matter of the petition of Jacob Shenkle and others for the establishment of a road in Liberty township Mason Gorbey, William Cooper and W. L. Hadley were appointed viewers.

In the matter of George McLaughlin's petition for a county road in Barlow township, Thomas Fleming, C. H. Goddard and J. A. Gage were appointed viewers.

Allowances amounting to \$148 were made for costs in Justices' courts and sheep claims also allowed aggregating \$855.10.
