GEN. MACEO

Beats the Spaniards in Five Battles for a Convoy.

The Most Formidable Expedition Ever Landed on Cuban Soil.

In All These Engagements Maceo Out-Generalled His Foes—The Spaniards' Loss Was Over 600 Men—Callisto Garcia Leaves Bayamo District.

(Correspondence of the United Associated Presses.)

HAVANA, Oct. 10, via Tampa, Fla., Oct. 15.—The following is an account of the last fight in Pinar del Rio, gathered from information received here from Spanish sources:

Maceo left the hills with about 2,000 or 3,000 men to meet an expedition which has landed on the extreme point of the island, somewhere about Dimas, which expedition, it appears, is not the one brought by the "Three Friends," as reported, but one fitted out in France, or some other place, with Cuban funds collected in France, commanded by a well known Havana lawyer named Fernando Friere Andrade. The expedition appears to have been the most formidable ever landed in Cuba, and is said to have consisted of about 5,000 rifles, 1,000,000 cartridges, 5,000 blankets and water-proofs, two or three cannon, dynamite, medicines, etc., etc.

Weyler, being informed of the landing and that Maceo had sent forces to convey the expedition to the hills, sent five columns, in combination with each other, to intercept his way and if possible, capture the convoy. As a result of this communication there occurred five successive engagements in which the Spaniards are said to have lost over six hundred men without obtaining their coveted object, since Maceo is now reported to have reached the hills in safety without losing a single pack mule on the way.

In all these engagements Maceo has outgeneralled all his foes and has demonstrated his great capacity as a military leader and his remarkable skill and courage. Maceo, having succeeded in reaching his mountain strong holds with the powerful elements he has now obtained, it can be safely predicted that it will be utterly impossible for the Spaniards to dislodge him, as it would require nearly 100,000 men for that purpose, according to the opinion of well informed and impartial persons. There is no doubt that he has sustained great losses, but everybody believes that they are much smaller than those of the Spaniards.

Calixto Garcia, with 5,500 men and four pieces of artillery, left the Bayamo district recently in the direction of Camaguey. He is believed now to be in that province to join Gomez. His ultimate purpose is unknown.

CUBAN WAR.

The Administration Comes to the Conclusion That a Stop Should Be Put to It.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 15.—Although Spanish representatives are claiming with a great deal of confidence that the Cuban rebellion will be crushed within a few weeks, the authorities here are beginning to realize that it is high time, in the interest of humanity, of commerce generally and of the United States in particular, that a stop be put to the useless war.

This, in the minds of most of the officials at Washington, is the most important international question of the hour.

How to act is the great problem which the president and his cabinet have often before discussed, but they have patiently allowed the war in Cuba to drift along, hoping that time might work out a peaceful solution of the trouble.

While there is a disposition in some quarters to let the Cuban question pass as an inheritance to the next administration, it is difficult to see how President Cleveland can stave off action much longer. All the members of the cabinet realize this, and ere long some important development may be expected.

The Hancock Arrives at Smyrna.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 15.—The dispatch vessel Hancock reached Smyrna Thursday morning, according to a telegram received at the navy department from Adm. Schfridge. It is stated at the navy department that the little vessel must have exhausted her coal supply in the 1,500 mile voyage, the length of the Mediterranean, and she will undoubtedly remain at Smyrna for several days at least to refill her bunkers. It will then depend entirely upon circumstances whether she will proceed to her intended eventual destination at Constantinople.

Ascending Banker Arrested.

PHILADELPHIA, Oct. 15.—Adolphus Cohen Cole, a former banker at No. 221 Canal street, New York, who absconded two years ago with \$500,000 belonging to Italian banks in Pennsylvania and New York, was arrested at the Broad station of the Pennsylvania railroad by Detective Donaghy. He was about to take his departure on a train when captured.

Receipts and Expenditures.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 15.—The first half of October shows a deficit of \$5,739,873, and for the fiscal year to date of \$30,934,000. The total receipts for the fiscal year to date have been \$91,575,070 and the expenditures have aggregated \$122,509,079. The receipts for the month of October to date have been \$12,400,120 and the expenditures \$18,104,000.

Bids Rejected.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 15.—The war department has rejected the bids for forgings of mortars and small guns, some ninety in all, and called for new proposals. The prices ranged from about 29 cents to 35 cents a pound, which was considered excessive.

ATLANTA, Ga., Oct. 15.—John Marion, a Floyd county farmer, has lost his mind over the political situation.

BANKER RAMBUSCH

Said to Be Short in His Accounts About \$300,000.

JUNEAU, Wis., Oct. 15.—Appraisers and attorneys have been closeted behind closed doors all day examining into the affairs of W. T. Rambusch, the missing banker and financial agent. Their work will not be concluded until Thursday, but enough is known to satisfy the public that Rambusch's affairs are in very bad shape and that many people will have to suffer on account of his financial irregularities. Judge Christensen, who was another friend of the missing man, estimates that his liabilities will amount to \$300,000.

Late Tuesday night a warrant was issued for the arrest of President Rambusch, on the charge of embezzlement. A rumor current Wednesday that Rambusch had telegraphed his wife from New York that he would return, is denied by Mrs. Rambusch. Absolutely nothing is known concerning the whereabouts of the missing man. All fledged Not Guilty.

COLUMBUS, O., Oct. 15.—Michael Heilmich and Mrs. Alwilda Dill, who have been indicted by the grand jury for the killing of Newton Dill, the husband of the latter, were arraigned in criminal court Wednesday, and pleaded not guilty. Mrs. Hannah Powell, indicted for murder in the second degree, for the killing of her daughter, was also arraigned, and pleaded not guilty.

Dropped Dead of Heart Disease.

YOUNGSTOWN, O., Oct. 15.—John S. Besore, one of Youngstown's best known citizens, dropped dead Thursday-morning shortly after reaching his post of duty at the Brown, Bonnell Iron company's plant. Mr. Besore has been identified with the above industry for the past 30 years. Heart failure is given as the cause of his death.

The Largest Squash.

CINCINNATI, Oct. 15.—W. A. Gray, a commission merchant on Sixth street, received a squash Thursday weighing 150 pounds. It was raised in the swampy lake region in northern Ohio from a seed sent to a grower in Danbury, O. It is said to be the largest squash ever grown in the United States.

Celia Rose's Trial.

MANSFIELD, O., Oct. 15.—At Celia Rose's trial physicians testified that poison was found in the stomachs of the Rose family. Guy Berry, the young man with whom Celia was infatuated, also testified. Rev. Mr. Deisher, of Lucas, testified for the defense that the girl is of unsound mind.

The Archbishop's Remains in Canterbury.

CANTERBURY, Oct. 15.—The body of Most Rev. Edward White Benson, archbishop of Canterbury, arrived Wednesday evening. Immense crowds had gathered about the station and the streets through which the cortege passed on its way to the cathedral were lined with people, who stood with bare heads as the body was borne past. Shortly after arrival at the cathedral, where the body will lie in state, there was celebrated a solemn service for the dead.
