McKinley's Tribute to Old Washington, the Mother County.
In part Major McKinley said to the immense delegation from Washington county on Thursday of this week at Canton:

These representatives of Marietta recall to our minds that it was the first settlement in this great commonwealth and I have thought it might not be untimely to pay some tribute to the great men, the noble pioneers, to whom we owe so much for our civilization and great commonwealth, for I recall many visits to Marietta and remember with pride and pleasure my receptions there.

Washington county may well boast a long line of eminent and patriotic citizens, for they are the common pride of the state and country. It requires no effort of the memory to recall such great and honored names as Rufus Putnam, Major Tipper, Commodore Whipple, Judge Ephraim Cutler, Return J. Meigs, Dr. Hildreth, Ohio's greatest historian, Dr. Andrews, of grand old Marietta college; that great organizer of the volunteer army, General Buell; General John H. Eaton, commissioner of the national bureau of education; sturdy old William P. Cutler, and that hero of Sherman's great march, General Fearing, and that other splendid soldier, Colonel Hildebrand, distinguished in the battle of Shiloh.

All these come to my mind as I speak to you, but I miss a familiar face and regret his unavoidable absence—that of my old friend, the brave and gallant commander of the Iron Brigade, General Rufus R. Daves, to whom I wish the greatest peace and happiness in his declining years, which are full of honor and the happy recollection of good deeds bravely done.

It is such men as these, my fellow-citizens, that have made our country great and deservedly distinguished above all others. I never speak to a Washington county audience, I never see the people of dear old Marietta, the first settlement of the great west, without thinking of the boundless blessings these first settlers, perhaps unconsciously, brought to their beloved country and to mankind.

us that which commands the highest patriotism and noblest aspirations of American citizenship. Our honor is impugned; our currency is threatened; our courts our assaulted; the very fabric of government is involved in the controversy which we must settle one week from next Tuesday. This is not a partisan contest; it is a contest built upon genuine patriotism and looking to genuine Americanism.

"I was glad to hear my young friend, Master Arbour, representing the Boys' Brigade from the Congregational church. What he said was well said of the necessity of standing by the country, and I want to say to these young men that there is nothing half so good in all this world as clean hands, pure hearts and upright, noble purposes.

"No danger can ever come to this republic so long as we carry the American flag in our hands and keep it in our hearts. I speak to all my fellow-citizens of Ohio when I say that this is the year when you are to determine, each for himself, whether or not he wants a return to that prosperity from which he ran away in 1893, and whether or not he wants to continue that industrial policy which increases debts of the government and debts for the people, and want and destitution for all of us.

"The Republican party stands for an honest dollar; for the maintenance of the public honor; for sustaining the public faith; for sustaining incorruptible the courts of the country; and for proclaiming to all the world that this is a government of law and that the law must be supreme over all.

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MASSACRED.

Bushmen Attack Part of an Austrian Scientific Expedition.

Baron Foulton von Norbeck, Four Sailors and a Guide Killed.

The Party Were Attacked on the Island of Guadalcanar, One of the Solomon Group—The Austrians Finally Put the Bushmen to Flight.

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 23.—News of the massacre of part of an Austrian scientific party on the island of Guadalcanar, in the Solomon group, reached this city Thursday by the steamer Monowai. The party left Sydney to cruise about and visit the Solomon islands in scientific research in the Austrian man-of-war Albatross. They had visited all the isles, except Guadalcanar, on which there is a mountain called the Lion's Head. The party wanted to reach the summit and hired native guides. They started for the summit on the 5th of August. In the party were Baron Foulton von Norbeck, Lieut. Budik, 20 sailors, two midshipmen, two servants and two native guides. After two days march one of the midshipmen, and seven sailors returned, as they became too fatigued to proceed farther. The day they left the camp the baron, Lieut. Budik, seven sailors and two servants started up the mountain. Several bushmen met on the way joined the expedition, but as they were without arms, no particular attention was paid to them. The baron was in the lead all the way, and as he neared the top of the mountain a bushman, who appeared to be a chief, was seen by the party. As he appeared two shots were fired lower down the mountain from the direction of the camp. The shots seemed to be a signal for the chief to attack the baron's party. Bushmen from a score of places at once rushed out and the baron was struck on the neck with a tomahawk, while a crowd of bushmen attacked the rest of the party with clubs. The native who had cut down the baron was promptly shot by a sailor, Lieut. Budik also put his revolver to good use. One sailor had to protect himself with a tomahawk he had wrested from a native. The other sailors were well armed and the bushmen finally had to retreat to the woods, many of them wounded. The baron was the only one of the party badly hurt. At first it was thought he would recover, but he gradually sank after he had walked back to camp and died in three hours.

The news was then sent to Capt. Maulock of the Albatross, and a relief party was sent, and a safe return was made to the ship. After the injured men had been taken aboard the Albatross Capt. Maulock started for Cook town and thence the Albatross will go to Sydney.

AMERICAN FARMERS.
At Least Two Hundred Million Bushels of Wheat in Their Hands.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 23.—The secretary of agriculture Thursday gave expression to the following regarding the recent rise in wheat: "The rise of wheat in Chicago and New York markets during the last 60 days is about 20 cents a bushel. This, on a crop of 450,000,000 bushels makes \$90,000,000. And at least two hundred million bushels of this wheat are now in the hands of American farmers. Thus in less than sixty days wheat has made for its producers about forty millions of dollars."

Southern Australia Harvest a Failure.
ADELAIDE, Oct. 23.—There has been a total failure of the harvest in the northern part of southern Australia, caused by a long-continued drought. Numbers of farmers have been ruined by the loss of their crops and are in a destitute condition. Wheat is one of the staple products of the colony. The latest statistics showing that of the 2,525,674 acres under cultivation in 1892-93, 1,726,711 acres were sown to wheat.

Americans Building a Chinese Railway.
PEKIN, Oct. 23.—An American syndicate will advance 30,000,000 taels for the construction of the Ankow-Pekin railway. The line will be several hundred miles long and will cross 27 rivers, including the Whang-Ho, all of which will have to be bridged. The entire works will be transferred to the syndicate, but the shares of the company will ostensibly be held by China.

A dispatch from Helsingford says that an unknown steamer has been lost off Kallbaden, Eng. The fate of her crew has not been ascertained.

The Boston Rubber Shoe Co. will start up its two factories on full time Monday, employing some 3,000 men. All the people laid off last summer will resume work.

A dispatch from Aden says that the small British steamer Tuna, Capt. Peters, has been wrecked off Zeyla in a cyclone in the Gulf of Aden. Her crew was lost.

Nine prisoners confined in the United States jail at Fort Smith, Ark., succeeded in making their escape some time Thursday night and have not yet been recaptured.

Joe Patchen, in his attempt to beat his record of 2:05 1/4 on a half-mile track, was only able to make 2:09 at Riverside park, Fall River, Mass., Thursday afternoon.

Haney & Campbell, manufacturers of creamery supplies, Dubuque, Ia., were attached Thursday after giving mortgages for \$32,567. Liabilities and assets will reach \$214,629.


