Gathered From All Parts of the Country by Telegraph. Politicians and public men generally in Washington appear to agree in the opinion that President-elect McKinley has already determined to offer ex-President Harrison a place in his cabinet.

A special from Victoria, Mex., says: Gov. Gaudalpe Maniero, of Victoria, has been granted a concession for the construction of a railroad from San Miguel, a town opposite Rio Grande City, Tex., to the Gulf railroad.

President Von Der Ahe, of the St. Louis Base Ball Club, states that there is absolutely no foundation for the rumor that negotiations have been, or are now in progress, for the purchase of his club by the Baltimore club owners.

The second convention of the Lutheran League of America will be held in Chicago November 17 to 20. About 800 delegates and visitors are expected to be in attendance.

Ma J. McKinley is rapidly recovering from the effects of the mental strain and arduous labors of the campaign, and Sunday evening expressed himself as being quite fully rested.

A dispatch from Seville, Spain, to the Central News, London, says that two steamers have been wrecked by collision at the entrance to the Guadalquivir river.

The Sheffield Coal, Iron and Steel Co., Memphis, Tenn., on Thursday received an order for 4,000 tons of pig iron at an advance of 50 cents a ton over pre-emption prices.

The entire business portion of the town of Spencer, W. Va., was wiped out by fire Monday morning at 12:30, including the bank, two hotels and 39 business places.

RATES OF TAXATION!

FOR THE YEAR 1896. In the Several Townships, Towns, &c., IN WASHINGTON COUNTY, OHIO.

In conformity with the law, I, G. J. LUND, Treasurer of Washington County, Ohio, do hereby notify the tax-payers of said County, that the rates of taxes for the year 1896 are correctly set forth in the following table, showing the amount levied on each dollar valuation in mills of the several Townships and Corporations of said County:

SPECIAL ASSESSMENTS

In the City of Marietta, due December 20th, 1896, and June 20th, 1897, and not included in the above rates. Paving Second Street, center of Butler to Ohio.

Greene Street, from Second to Fourth. Second Street, from Putnam to Butler. Putnam Street, from Second to Seventh.

Front Street, from Putnam to Montgomery. Gilman Street, from Putnam Avenue to Knox Street. Sewer in Second District.

The entire delinquencies, together with all road tax, and one-half of all other taxes charged on the duplicate of 1896, are required to be paid on or before the 20th day of December, and the remainder on or before the 20th of June next.

Special attention is called to Section 1094, Laws of Ohio, which reads as follows: "When one-half the taxes as aforesaid, charged against any entry on a tax duplicate in the hands of a County Treasurer, is not paid on or before the 20th day of December next after the same has been so charged, or when the remainder of such taxes is not paid on or before the 20th day of June next, the County Treasurer shall proceed to collect the same by distress or otherwise, together with a penalty of Five PER CENTUM on the amount of taxes so delinquent; and in all cases where such half of any taxes other than real estate has not been paid on the 20th day of December, the whole amount of taxes, other than real estate, for the current year, so charged, shall be due and delinquent, and shall be collected in the manner and with the penalty provided in this section."

All persons having failed to pay their taxes last June should see that they are paid before the 20th day of December so that they may not be advertised as delinquent and offered for sale on the Third Tuesday of January next, and thereby save expense.

When you ask by letter or postal card for the amount of your taxes, designate your property clearly. State in whose name it appears on the duplicate, Township, Section and number of acres; if in town, name and number of lot, and in whose addition. SEND STAMP FOR REPLY.

Send money by certificate of deposit, post-office money order or registered letter. The Treasurer's office will be open daily, (Sundays and holidays excepted) during business hours from date until the 20th day of December next, and from the 1st day of April, 1897 to the 20th day of June, 1897, to receive said taxes. Every effort will be made to accommodate parties paying taxes. Those who call early and pay their taxes will save themselves, as well as the Treasurer, a great deal of time and prevent the disagreeable rush at the close of the season.
