PERSONAL AND LOCAL.

The Marietta Shriners who attended the special meeting at Wheeling Thursday night, returned home Friday. Messrs. Chancellor and Van Winkle, of Parkersburg, were in the city on business Friday.

Miss Nelly returned home to Parkersburg Friday, after a pleasant visit with Mrs. W. R. Grimes.

Mr. Maurice R. Coste leaves Sunday for Moundsville, W. Va., where he will sing at the concert of the Ladies' Mandolin and Guitar Club of that city, Monday evening.

Auditor W. A. Patterson left yesterday morning for Macon, Ill., to be gone ten days, visiting relatives.

C. E. Tresch, the popular watchmaker at Atkin's jewelry store, has resigned his position to accept a similar one with D. B. Anderson, Marietta. Mr. Tresch has made a host of friends in this city, who will be sorry to see him leave Cambridge. He is a gentleman and a mechanic of the first number.—Cambridge Sun.

In a conversation which the Leader had with Engineer Felkel just previous to his leaving this city, he stated that he would return here next week in company with Mr. Jutte, the promoter of the Ohio River bridge scheme, and would then have his plans in definite shape. It is the desire of the promoters that the enterprise receive encouragement from the local railroads so that it may be built with the end in view of one day carrying a north and south road into West Virginia. Failing to receive the co-operation of the roads entering this city the bridge will, according to the statement of Mr. Felkel, be built for highway travel and electric road purposes. The building of an electric line from Marietta to Parkersburg is contemplated by Mr. Jutte. Mr. Felkel hinted that the good will of the city would be necessary for the furtherance of the scheme in the beginning, and after that something more substantial.

Mr. Fred Clark, who has been employed at Anderson's jewelry store, this city, will go into business for himself at Beverly, where he is well known.

By the death of Judge de Steiguer there was a vacancy in the Judgeship of this district, which was filled by the appointment of Judge elect J. M. Wood, who took the oath of office on last Saturday and on Monday opened court with the ease and grace of an old Judge.—Athens Journal.

The Marietta College football team will meet the O. U. eleven for the second time this season at Athens today.

James H. Dye has returned from Logan, accompanied by his uncle, Dr. J. H. Dye, whose health is somewhat improved.

In Squire Guyton's court a warrant has been issued for the arrest of Watson Yerlan, of Coal Run, on the charge of non-support of minor child.

Mr. Frederick Smith, of Independence township, was taken to the Athens State Hospital by Deputy Sheriff McCallister Friday. He was adjudged insane in Probate Court several days ago.

In The Oil Fields.

The Murphy Oil Co. has brought in another excellent well. It is the Hardman 37 on Davis Run which came in the first of the week and starts at a 500 barrel gait. It is the best well yet drilled on that farm and really the biggest well in the field. It has caused quite an excitement in that vicinity and wells will go down thick and fast all around it.

J. L. Simpson, the contractor, came in from Plum Run this week, where he recently drilled a well on the Hardman-Livingstone tract, good for something like 500 barrels and is the best well in that field.

The oil business is beginning to look up all along the line and promises to be better this winter than ever.—West Union Record.

Another good producing well has been added to the list in the Henderson field.

This late addition to the producers is the Hostetter & Tennant well, about three-quarters of a mile southeast of Kelly & Mobley's Henderson No. 1. It was drilled in yesterday and parties who saw it estimated it at 75 barrels. This gives a big extension to the field.

There is no doubt that the entire field will be developed promptly, for the reason that leases are owned by numerous parties, none of whom have very large holdings. Locations have been made for a number of new wells and work is under way inside and outside defined limits.—Sentinel.
