ANNUAL REPORT

Of the Ordnance and Fortification Board.

Work of Placing Our Harbors in a State of Defense Progressing.

The Principal Ports Will Present a Formidable Front to an Attacking Fleet—Guns and Carriages That Are Equal to Any in the World.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 17.—The annual report of the board of ordnance and fortifications, composed of Gen. Nelson A. Miles, Col. Royal T. Frank, first artillery; Col. Peter C. Haines, corps of engineers; Maj. F. H. Phipps, ordnance department; Capt. J. C. Ayres and ex-Representative J. H. Outwater was made public Tuesday. It says:

Under the increased appropriations of the present fiscal year the work of placing our harbors in a proper state of defense is making good progress and if only the same sums are appropriated annually for a few years, our principal ports will present a formidable front to an attacking fleet. It is hoped, however, that even more liberal appropriations will be made in order that we may sooner be ready for an emergency that may arise at any time.

The wars of nations occur in cycles of varying length but seldom does a general convention pass without a great conflict. Already more than thirty years have elapsed since our last great war and another may soon, if the past be a guide to the future, terminate one of the longest intervals of peace we have ever enjoyed.

Our engineer department is replete with the most modern plans for fortifications, and our ordnance department is prepared with designs for guns and carriages that are equal to any in the world. If congress will but increase the appropriations to the capacity of those departments for useful and economical work, it will not be long before our coasts are secure against the attack of foreign powers. An effective preparation for war is the best safeguard against war.

The board is more than ever convinced of the wisdom of the recommendation it made in its last annual report that regular annual appropriations be made for sea-coast defenses and their armament.

SHOOTING AFFRAY In Which Three Men Were Mortally Wounded Near Swainsboro, Ga.

AGUSTA, Ga., Nov. 17.—A serious shooting affair occurred at McLeads, a small station five miles below Swainsboro, Ga., in which three young men, Felix Rountree and two brothers, John and Lawson Sutton, were mortally wounded. The men had some words about a settlement at Sutton's gin. John Sutton knocked Rountree down with a piece of iron. Rountree rose, drew a pistol and shot five times, missing them.

JUDGE PARKER DEAD. A Man Who Has Probably Passed the Death Sentence on More Men Than Any Other Judge in This Country.

FORT SMITH, Ark., Nov. 17.—Judge Parker died at 2:40 Tuesday morning. He had been suffering from a complication of diseases arising from fatty degeneration of the heart for the last four or five months. Judge Parker represented the St. Joseph, Mo., district in congress and he was appointed to the bench by President Grant in 1874.

Additional Tax on Beer. NEW YORK, Nov. 17.—A Times special from Washington says: An attempt will be made during the coming session of congress to put an additional tax of \$30,000,000 on beer. The champions of the proposition say that the tax would not involve any additional expense to the government and would be very easily collected. Others say, however, that there is no likelihood of such a bill passing. They say the brewers were able to defeat it before, and they are just as able now.

A Youthful Murderer. NORFOLK, Va., Nov. 17.—There is now under arrest at the police station a 14-year-old prisoner against whom is entered the charge of murder. He is Willie Degege, the son of John L. Degege, one of the clerks at the post office, and he was arrested on a warrant sworn out by Peter F. Dickinson of this city, for the alleged murder of young Peter Dickinson, aged 12 years.

Chicago and Northern Pacific Road Sold. CHICAGO, Nov. 17.—The Chicago and Northern Pacific railroad was Tuesday sold by Master in Chancery Bishop for \$5,000,000. The sale took place at noon. Only one bid was made, and that by the re-organization committee of the bond-holders.

The Yorktown Goes to Chin Kiang. WASHINGTON, Nov. 17.—The gunboat Yorktown, which is making a tour of Chinese ports, left Wuhu Tuesday morning for Chin Kiang.
