New Base Ball League.

At a meeting of base ball managers
which will be held in this city next
Monday there will be completed the
permanent organization of a minor
league of clubs of the smaller Ohio
cities. The work of getting the
League on its feet has been going on
for several months, but was withheld
from publication in order to avoid the
antagonism of 'knockers' who pre-
vented the same project being brought
to a successful conclusion last summer.
The league is now a sure go. It will
be composed of four clubs under sanc-

BUCKEYE NEWS.

New and Interesting Happenings Within
Our Borders.
A DECISION

By the Supreme Court That Will Seriously
Cripple the Work of the Food and Dairy
Department.

COLUMBUS, O., Dec. 4.—A very impor-
tant decision was handed down by the
supreme court Friday. It will, so Dr. Mc-
Neal says, seriously cripple the work of
the food and dairy department. It was
in the case of the state vs. Glen A. Em-
ery, taken to the supreme court on ex-
ception by the prosecuting attorney to
the ruling of the Lucas county common
pleas court. The supreme court says,
all the judges concurring:

1. The reference in Section 3, of the
pure drug statute (§7 Ohio laws 248), to
the United States Pharmacopoeia, is to
the edition in general use when the
statute was enacted, which was that
of 1880.
2. The sale of a drug which was
equal to the standard of strength,
quality and purity laid down in that
edition is not rendered unlawful be-
cause it is below a higher standard
laid down in a subsequently revised
edition, though that edition was in
general use when the sale was made.
3. A copy of the subsequent revised
edition is not competent evidence in
the trial of a prosecution under the
statute.
Exceptions overruled.

Ex-State Senator Gear's Trial.

COLUMBUS, O., Dec. 4.—The trial of
ex-State Senator W. C. Gear on the
charge of bribery was begun Thurs-
day. The prosecution witness, ex-
State Senator D. H. Gaumer, testified
that while the bill to recompense him
to the amount of the costs of his con-
test for the seat was pending Gear sug-
gested to him that it would cost him half
the amount, \$774, to get it through the
senate. Gaumer ignored the remark
and the bill passed, but Gear sent two
letters and a telegram to him request-
ing to be recompensed for services in
getting the bill through. He suggest-
ed that he be paid \$175.

Soldiers' and Sailors' Orphans.

COLUMBUS, O., Dec. 4.—The annual
report of the trustees of the Ohio Sol-
diers' and Sailors' Orphans' home,
filed with Gov. Bushnell Friday,
shows an enrollment of 1,400,
of whom, on November 15,
1,186 were actually present at
the home. There were 384 admis-
sions and 113 re-admissions during the
year and 73 deaths. The average
daily population was 1,041. The per
capita cost of maintenance was \$149.20,
the total expense of the home being
\$155,318.55.

Condition of the Wheat Crop.

COLUMBUS, O., Dec. 4.—The state
board of agriculture issued a crop re-
port Thursday evening showing the
condition of the wheat crop as it en-
ters the winter. The condition is put
at 91 per cent. of a full average, and
adds that the plant is well rooted and
will stand a fairly severe winter well.
The corn product this year for the
state is estimated at 41 bushels per
acre.

The Miners Rescued.

COLUMBUS, O., Dec. 4.—About noon
Thursday the last two miners were
rescued from the burning mine No. 2
at Dorthick, and not a living thing re-
mains in the ill-fated tomb. Hal Ter-
rence and Will Harbaugh were pulled,
more dead than alive, through the
opening of the air shaft, after a siege
of difficulties that few men would have
overcome.

Sunday Saloon Law Case.

COLUMBUS, O., Dec. 4.—A Sunday
saloon law case came to the supreme
court Thursday from Tuscarawas coun-
ty. Owner Daugherty, a saloon keep-
er, was convicted of violating the Sun-
day law and fined \$50 and costs. The
common pleas court affirmed the judg-
ment, but the circuit court reversed it
on error.

Two Drowned in the Reservoir.

TOLEDO, O., Dec. 4.—A special from
St. Mary's O., says: Arthur Palmer,
of Montezuma, O., and E. L. Godfrey,
of Montezuma, Pa., both oil men, were
drowned in the reservoir there Friday
morning. Palmer broke through the ice
and Godfrey went under while en-
deavoring to rescue his companion.

Fighting for His Life.

COLUMBUS, O., Dec. 4.—The applica-
tion for a new trial for Lee Martin
Miller, who is under sentence to hang
for the killing of Marshal Schultz, of
Tiffin, was argued in the supreme
court Thursday. The condemned man
was represented by Attorneys Royer,
McCauley and Weller, of Tiffin.

Appointed General Freight Agent.

COLUMBUS, O., Dec. 4.—W. W. Dan-
iels, of this city, was Friday appointed
general freight agent of the Columbus,
Sandusky & Hoeking Railroad Co.
Mr. Daniels held this position several
years ago, but was deposed when Mon-
saratt became president of the com-
pany.

Hyland Claims an Alibi.

COLUMBUS, O., Dec. 4.—Joseph Hy-
land, who is being tried here as an al-
leged post office swindler, in operations
covering eight states, denies his guilt.
He is trying to establish an alibi as to
Newark, O., for the swindling of whose
post office he is being tried.

Torn to Pieces in the Machinery.

TOLEDO, O., Dec. 4.—At Columbus
Grove Thursday Daniel Howell, fore-
man of the Zink woolen mills, was
caught in the machinery and torn to
pieces before the machinery could be
stopped.

WONDERFUL FULFILLMENT OF NANSEN'S
PREDICTIONS.

McClure's Magazine for December.
Nearly everything Nansen predicted
about his journey has come true. He
said he expected to cross the unknown
polar area, and he has done it. He
foretold exactly the general direction
in which his ship would drift, while
fast in the ice, but it is not certain
that he correctly assigned the cause of
this drift. . . . Nansen invented the
model of the 'Fram,' making her hull
round and slippery like an eel, with no
corners or sharp edges for the ice to
seize upon. She is the strongest vessel
ever used in Arctic exploration. He
said that pressure would simply lift
her on the ice, and so her bottom, near
the keel, was made almost flat, in order
that she might not capsize while on
the ice surface; and her screw and
rudder were also ingeniously protected.
The many experts who said her design
would not save the 'Fram' from in-
stant destruction were mistaken; for
she met these relentless ice pressures,
and they merely lifted her out of her
cradle and she rested safely on the sur-
face.
Nansen said that, owing to the prob-
able predominance of water in the far
north, he expected to find there higher
temperatures than along the north
coast of Asia. This remarkable predic-
tion has been fulfilled. The lowest
temperature observed on the 'Fram'
was 61 1/4 deg. Fahrenheit, while farther
south, in the Kara Sea, -63 deg., and
at the mouth of the Lena River—94
deg., have been registered.
