The trial of Frank Devoil for shooting his neighbor, David Newton, last summer occupied the entire day Wednesday and the jury, after being out a short time, returned a verdict of shooting with intent to wound. The prosecution made a very strong case against the accused. Prosecuting Attorney Preston was assisted by L. W. Ellenwood, Messrs. A. D. Follett and W. G. Way conducting the case for the defendant. Immediately upon the announcement of the verdict the defendant gave notice of a motion for a new trial. The penalty for shooting with intent to wound is the same as for shooting with intent to kill—imprisonment in the penitentiary not less than one or more than four years.

Wednesday morning Dr. Laming, of this city, received a telegram announcing the death of his mother at her home in Indiana. He left at once to attend the funeral.

Mr. and Mrs. G. S. Mitchell left Wednesday for their home at Cresson, Pa., after a pleasant visit here with Mr. and Mrs. W. H. Lord.

Early Wednesday evening a lamp exploded or was knocked from a table at the residence of Mrs. Rhinehart, corner of Fourth and Warren streets, and set fire to the floor. An alarm from box 45 called the department to the scene, but the fire was extinguished before the wagon arrived. The damage is very slight.

The Cincinnati Commercial Tribune has the following concerning athletics at the University in that city: The faculty of the University having withdrawn in disgust from participation in the affairs athletic of the students on account of the introduction of "ringers" into the latter's football games, the Board of Directors of the University has taken the matter up for thorough investigation. When the faculty withdrew they informed their committee "for the regulation of athletics" that its services would no longer be needed. The committee held its last meeting yesterday afternoon, and disbanded, after, however, placing the funds and other property of which it had charge, in the hands of the three student and the three alumni members.
