





—The case in which the National Supply Co., of Pittsburg, is endeavoring to secure the extradition of Mr. Daniel Hanneb, of this city, for the alleged larceny of a note, was heard by Governor Bushnell Tuesday. Judge W. B. Loomis, of this city, was at Columbus, representing Mr. Hanneb's interests. The Governor reserved his decision until tomorrow. It was reported Tuesday night that Gov. McCorkle, of West Virginia, had honored the requisition for Hanneb's return to Pittsburg from that state. The wedding occurred at St. Marys Catholic Church, and was performed by Father Woesman most impressively. The church was beautifully decorated and the music was unusually fine and embraced some novel features. A splendid breakfast was served at the bride's home on Butler street, after which the happy couple left for the East, accompanied by scores of good wishes.

—District Lecturer J. C. Preston was at New Matamoras Monday evening and inspected the Masonic lodge of that town.

—William Witham will be tried before Squire B. E. Guyton today on the charge of selling liquor to Delbert Hardy, a minor.

—Another case of "essence of cinnamon" poisoning is reported from Charleston, W. Va. James Cart, died on Cabin Creek, near Coalburg, Monday, from the effects of essence of cinnamon, 26 bottles of which he drank last Saturday in lieu of whiskey, which could not be obtained.

Barnsdall and Ranger's No. 3 on Roberts at Corning came in Monday evening and is reported to be good for 50 barrels.

The well being drilled on the Haga farm in the Cats Creek development by Longfellow & Co. is in and is a dry hole. It is located about three-fourths of a mile from the big producers on the same farm. The rig is now being moved to another location one-fourth of a mile east.

Longfellow Bros. & Co. have two wells spudding on the Widow Rubrake farm southwest of Reed in the Cats Creek development.

Three new rigs are up on the Reed farm at Cats Creek, but operations are at a standstill, probably on account of the falling market.

Vaughn & Longfellow began spudding Tuesday on the McGinness farm east of Mackburg and also on the George Irish place adjoining.

A new well is starting on the Richard Pyles tract one mile west of Mackburg and a rig is being erected on John Hutchins.

The West Oil Co.'s well on the West farm in the Hendershot field Saturday made a flow and put 129 barrels of fluid in the tank. As the hole was not nearly cleaned out it is expected that the next flow will far exceed this.

Among the wells now drilling and starting in the Ogden field are the Dyke No. 5, Pollock No. 1, the No. 1 on the Love farm and the rig completed for No. 2. The timbers are also on the ground for No. 3. A rig is up on the Daniel Gribble farm, and one on the Alleman farm.

A letter from Beverly Tuesday morning stated that the Wolf Creek Oil Company's well on the C. C. Smith farm, which was drilled in and thought to be dry last Saturday showed considerable oil in the hole. The tools are fast in the Berea sand. The well will be shot as soon as they can be extricated.

The rig of the Bartmess and Cross well on the Covey farm is being moved for the second time. The tools were in cleaning out the hole after a shot.

Christmas night the Berea well at Coal Run braced up for a flow and has been at it on a small scale ever since.
