COMMON PLEAS COURT.

Frank Brown Gets a Heavy Sentence for Selling Liquor.

Frank Brown, who was indicted by the grand jury last week for selling liquor in a local option township (Grandview) and for living on a shanty boat without paying the license, pleaded guilty before Judge Jones Thursday.

David H. Hood, who was indicted for attempting to commit a criminal assault upon his stepdaughter, was arraigned and pleaded not guilty.

A HOT MEETING.

Citizens Get Redheaded Over the Fourth Street Paving Contract.

A number of citizens met at the Council chamber Thursday evening to discuss the relative merits of Townsend Block and Jones Brick and the advisability of accepting either Mr. Townsend's or Mr. Berry's bid for paving Fourth street.

The meeting was essentially little more than a wrangle and resulted in nothing except angry and injudicious statements and accusations bordering closely on the disgraceful.

A vote was taken to secure the sentiment of the meeting and a practical tie resulted.

RIVER MEN OBJECT.

They Don't Want a Bridge Built at Belleaire.

BELLEAIR, O., Feb. 17.—The new bridge that has been surveyed across the river at this point to connect this city with Benwood, W. Va., is raising a great deal of excitement, especially among the river men, and it is very probable that before the bridge is erected there will be a case brought in the courts, as it is said that the river men will object very strongly to having the bridge built as it has been surveyed, holding that it would certainly be the most dangerous point along the Ohio river, where it would be almost impossible to throw a tow-boat to the fact that the river at this point is very narrow and the current is very swift.

A BIG SUIT.

Mrs. Helen Newman Claims \$10,000 Damages From Jacob Wittig.

A big damage suit was filed in Common Pleas Court Thursday by Attorneys R. E. Guyton and E. J. Catter, attorneys for the plaintiff, Mrs. Rosa Newman. Mrs. Newman's petition alleges that Mr. Jacob Wittig falsely accused her of stealing two rings and claims damages to the amount of \$10,000. The rings in question were taken last Saturday.
