They played with the Oil City team last season and would have played with the Southern league this year, but for its disbanding. Kellogg, one of the pitchers, stands six feet, four and one-half inches in his stocking feet, and it is said that his curves are too swift for most of the boys outside the National league.—Cambridge Sun.

### Still Falling.

Smith died at Nordhoff, California, on the 8th instant. His age was 78 years. For a number of years Gen. Smith had been connected with the regular army in the capacity of Paymaster.

PARKERSBURG, W. Va., April 13.—The old City Council held its final meeting tonight, and its last act before adjourning sine die at midnight was the passage of a curfew ordinance to take effect at once, making it illegal for children under the age of fourteen years to be on the streets alone after 9 p. m.

### Won and Confirmed.

The Townsend Brick and Contracting Company, of this city, have just had confirmed to them an important legal victory, gained in the court of Judge Shaw, at Peoria, Ill. The judge has refused their opponent's motion for a new trial. When this enterprising company began the great task of building fifty-three miles of sewer at Peoria, they sublet a mile of 8-foot tunnel to a Chicago firm, from whom they took a bond to finish the work, executed by a Chicago surety company. The sub-contractors found the work harder than they thought and soon threw it up. The Townsends finished the work at great loss and then sued the surety company for their loss on the bond. Judge Shaw gave them a judgment of \$9,719. There is not likely to be an appeal.—Zanesville Courier.

### A Large Telegraph System.

Superintendent Charles Selden of the B. & O. Telegraph said the other day that the average number of messages handled every day on the B. & O. system was 53,000, exclusive of train orders. The B. & O. has 22,252 miles of telegraph wire, of which they use 7,240 for Company's business and the balance is leased to the Western Union. There are 384 telegraph offices on the line of which 234 are reporting Western Union offices. Mr. Selden explains in his department 750 men, exclusive of linemen. He also has charge of the Block Signal offices which east of the Ohio River, average one to every six miles. The service of the Company's plant is considerably augmented by the use of several multiplex systems.
