## CONDENSED NEWS

Gathered From All Parts of the Country By Telegraph.

Andrew D. White, new United States ambassador to Germany, accompanied by his family, arrived in Berlin Tuesday.

Sam H. Winram, ex-city auditor and a prominent politician of Kansas City, Mo., is dead. He was born in Cincinnati in 1843 and served through the war in the navy.

Dan Creedon and Kid McCoy have been matched to fight at the Palace Athletic club, New York, within the next six weeks for a purse of \$8,000, the men to weigh 158 pounds. Each posted a \$1,000 forfeit Tuesday.

Paul Casimir-Perier, senator from the department of Seine-Inférieure, and uncle of the ex-president of that name, is dead. He was born in Paris in 1813, and was the second son of the illustrious minister of Louis Philippe.

Should the government accept the proposition of the Union Iron work to provide diagonal armor for the battleship Wisconsin, now in course of construction, it is thought an armor plate plant will be established in San Francisco.

At Kansas City, Mrs. Millie Smith, colored, whose husband was murdered by a street car conductor two years ago, was shot and instantly killed by Thomas Hayes, a Negro whom she had refused to marry. Hayes then killed himself.

While trying to arrest three burglars at 3:30 Wednesday morning in Omaha, Neb., Police Officers Tiedemann and Glover were shot, the former perhaps fatally. Glover's wounds are not thought to be serious. The burglars escaped.

The retiring United States ambassador, Edwin F. Uhl, had his farewell audience with Emperor William at noon Tuesday and presented his letters of recall. The under secretary for the foreign office, Baron von Rotnam, was present at the interview.

Mrs. Sarah A. Granger, widow of the late Julian N. Granger, and sister of Stephen A. Douglas, died at her home near Clifton Springs, N. Y., Tuesday, aged 85 years. She was postmistress there under President Arthur.

James Mannix died Tuesday at Finkell Landing, N. Y., from the effects of a blow of the fist struck by a brickyard workman Monday. The blow caused concussion of the brain. The identity of the man who committed the assault is not known. Three arrests have been made on suspicion.

Gen. Nelson A. Miles, U. S. A., paid a long visit Monday to the Italian minister of war, Lieut. Gen. Pollox, and while passing through Naples Gen. Miles visited the Puzioli artillery arsenal. The general started for London Tuesday, where he will represent the United States army at Queen Victoria's jubilee celebration.

At San Francisco, Arthur Gilroy, Alfred Williams, James F. and Kate Rogers were arrested by Secret Service Agent Harris upon the charge of being implicated with a dentist named Stark in the counterfeiting of five-dollar gold pieces. All four were arraigned before Commissioner Penocock and remanded for examination until the 16th instant.

Division No. 2, of the Missouri supreme court, in the cases of George Thompson (colored) and Andrew Warton, sentenced them to hang on July 8. Thompson killed Thomas Cunningham, sexton of a colored church in St. Louis, in an attempt to poison the organist. Warton is a gypsy who killed his wife in a flat boat on the Mississippi river at St. Louis.
