

**AT PARKERSBURG.**

Samuel Morgan Arrested for Burglarizing the West Side School House.

On Saturday evening, August 21st, the schoolhouse on the West Side was broken into and a kit of tools belonging to Wm. H. Cornell, a workman, were stolen. The matter was kept quiet by the police in the hope of catching the thief in the act of disposing of the property. Marshal Jake Dye on Wednesday caused the arrest of Samuel Morgan at Parkersburg on suspicion of his having been the culprit. When Morgan's shantyboat was searched the stolen tools were found and he confessed to the theft, agreeing to come back to Marietta for trial, and stating that he entered the school house at eight o'clock in the evening. Morgan was sent to the Reform School from this county ten years ago for participating in the burning of the Harmer Depot.

**Stole a Mileage Book.**

On the B. & O. S. W. train which left here at 4:55 Wednesday afternoon was a passenger with an unsigned mileage book. Upon being requested to sign the book by the conductor he did so and left it lying on his seat while he went to the water cooler. When he returned the book was gone and could not be found. He told Conductor Campbell of the loss and as that official went through the car a drummer nodded his head meaningly toward a couple of unknown men sitting in a seat across the aisle. Conductor Campbell took the hint and taxed the men with the theft with such a good bluff that one of them went down into his pocket and produced the missing book. The men left the train at Constitution.

**Handcuffed Him.**

When Officer Chris. Anders undertook to handcuff Samuel Morgan on the B. & O. S. W. train crossing from Parkersburg to Belpre Wednesday the prisoner made a desperate resistance and the steel bracelets were placed on him only by the united efforts of the Officer and several of the trainmen. He had evidently expected to escape at Belpre.

**Wells Sold for \$125,000.**

PARKERSBURG, W. VA., August 24 —Cox & Woodyard sold their holding in the Cornwallis oil field today for \$125,000 cash to A. S. Carr & Co., of Wheeling. The sale, which is the largest yet made in that territory, includes leases on 81,000 acres of oil land and eighteen producing wells.

**5,400 Watermelons.**

The Valley Belle broke all records last night for the number of watermelons carried by a single boat. She brought up the river consigned to local dealers, 5,400 melons, all of them from one farm near Letart. This is the second cargo received here within the past week—Sentinel.

Charles Leslie, who was arrested at Zanesville on the charge of stealing a watch from Mollie Williams, of this city, was bound over to court on Wednesday to await the action of the next grand jury. He was unable to give bond and is now in the county jail.
