

Still After Myers.

Mr. Matt Miraben returned last night from Sistersville, where he had been with Sheriff McCallister and Constable Parlin endeavoring to locate Scott Myers by the use of a bloodhound. Myers is most certainly a slick article, as the officers have been unable to come up to him, though hot on his trail for two days. It was expected that Myers would sleep last night at a certain house near Sistersville and the officers remained to watch the house.

Oil at Freeland.

Oil excitement has broken out in the vicinity of Freeland and there is talk of sinking several more wells. One on the farm owned by Abe Howell was shot at a depth of 1,300 feet and yielded five or six barrels of oil of a fine quality. BACK TO DRESDEN

Go Two of the Men Arrested Monday Night.

The Marshal of the town of Dresden came down on the Z. & O. R. Tuesday night in response to a telegram from Marshal Dye, stating that he had captured the men wanted by the former. The Dresden officers released one of the fellows, but will take the other two back home this morning to answer to the charge of stealing. It is alleged that one of the men took a large sum of money from his wife and decamped. The men live at Dresden and are probably not the fellows wanted at Athens for a robbery committed last week.

A year or more ago a case was tried here in which it was shown that a woman named Mulligan had taken a sum of money from her husband and decamped with another man, but the defense raised the point that a woman could not steal from her husband and Judge Sibley sustained it. It remains to be seen whether this case will have the same outcome.

A Big Wharf Subsided.

LISBON, Nov. 23.—At 6 o'clock Monday morning a big masonry wharf, having a frontage of 300 metres on the river Tagus, opposite the customs house, suddenly subsided and completely disappeared in the river bed. An official investigation has disclosed the fact that the wharf, which was recently constructed at a cost of £50,000 (\$250,000), rested on mud, soundings to the depth of 36 metres revealed no solid foundation.

Now a Political Organization.

CHICAGO, Nov. 23.—By changing its name and declaring new principles Monday the American Railway league has become a full-fledged political organization. Hereafter it will be known as the Railway Employees' and Telegraphers' Political League of America. Its proclaimed object is to deal entirely in state and national politics, chiefly on legislative lines.

CINCINNATI MAN

In a Spanish Prison Under Sentence of Death—International Complication. CINCINNATI, Nov. 23.—Joseph Grove De Peralta, a former citizen of Columbia, the east end suburb of Cincinnati, is lying in a Spanish dungeon in Havana under a decree of death, awaiting a report from this probate court as to his citizenship. Neil Rodgers informed Judge Ferris of the fact and the court placed the matter in the hands of an attorney with advice to offer at once the necessary proof.

De Peralta obtained citizen's papers in this court in 1882. All record of that transaction was destroyed in the courthouse fire. Hence oral evidence must be heard, and Judge Ferris says he will at once give a decree restoring the papers, and place the matter in the hands of Secretary of State Sherman for prompt action.

De Peralta led a small force of insurgents, composed of Cubans and Americans, against Havana three weeks ago.

They were surprised and captured by Capt. Gen. Blanco's forces. Next morning the Cubans, except De Peralta, were shot to death. The Americans were deported to the Spanish penal colony in the South African seas.

De Peralta obtained a respite from death by his claim of American citizenship and he was given until December 15 to prove his claim. He at once communicated with Joseph Doniphan, ex-furniture dealer, his brother-in-law, who lives on Columbia avenue, near Tusculum.

Charles Dawes Resigned.

COLUMBUS, O., Nov. 23.—The resignation of Charles Dawes, of Marietta, of the Ohio Centennial commission, has been placed in the hands of Gov. Bushnell. No selection to fill the vacancy has yet been made. The cause for the resignation is that Dawes expects to leave the state.

Potatoes for the South.

POMEROY, O., Nov. 23.—The towboat Victor left here Tuesday with six boats loaded with Meigs county potatoes for the southern markets, containing 12,500 barrels, also hay and stoneware.
