
Motion Overruled.

In Common Pleas Court Friday morning Judge Coultrap overruled the motion to quash the indictment in the McSweeney case, holding that the defendant's cause had been in no wise jeopardized. McSweeney's attorney excepted to the decision and filed a plea in abatement, to which the Prosecuting Attorney demurred. McSweeney was in the court house several hours while certain papers were being prepared and filed, and seemed to enjoy the brief liberty after so many weeks spent in jail. The State's demurrer was sustained and the attorneys for the prisoner then filed a general demurrer to the indictment, which will be disposed of today. Should this demurrer be overruled McSweeney will be arraigned and compelled to plead guilty or not guilty.


