## FOUND AT ZANESVILLE.

Ethel Hight and Clyde Russell, the youthful Runaways.

Several days ago the Leader noted the elopement of Ethel Hight, the 17-year-old daughter of William Hight, of this city, and Clyde Russell, a young news butcher on the Z. & O. R. At that time Mr. Hight was searching for his erring daughter, and the following from the Zanesville Times Recorder of Monday indicates that he found her:

A young man with a "munchy" discolored and swollen optic and a prepossessing young girl of about seventeen summers arrived in town Saturday morning, and not a great while thereafter were arrested and locked up in accordance with advices received from Marshal Dye, of Marietta.

The couple were Clyde Russell, a news butcher on the Z. & O. R., and Ethel Hight, daughter of W. B. Hight, a Marietta blacksmith. They were eloping, not necessarily to get married, but to get away from the girl's irate father, who had no use for Russell, whom he had struck in the eye for calling on his daughter.

Clyde says he loves Ethel and that Ethel loves him. Ethel has not said so, but actions in this case speak louder than words. They left Marietta on Tuesday night and drove to Caldwell, and from there they walked to this city, arriving as stated.

Father Hight was not asleep, but was hot on their trail. When he reached Caldwell he found that they had left for Zanesville, and he telegraphed Chief Beckley to arrest them, signing Marshal Dye's name, having his permission to do so.

Saturday night the elopers were brought before Mayor Gibson. He allowed Russell to go and then turned Ethel over to her father after giving her a sound lecture on the proper way a young girl should conduct herself. All during this trying admonition the girl never moved nor shed a tear, although a reference was made to her kind father and mother on whom she was bringing disgrace. She left the prison with her arm around her father's neck, crying and asking his forgiveness.

The stern parent took the girl to the Hotel Rogge and Sunday morning he took her to Columbus, where he intends placing her in a convent.

The girl says that she did not know whether Russell was going to marry her or not and did not know by her actions she was placing herself in a compromising position.

## The War Lecture.

The audience in attendance at the lecture last evening at the High School was of fair portion, but not so large as it should have been, considering the cause, the subject and the speaker.

Mr. R. T. Powell, "Little Red Cap," gave an intensely interesting account of his experiences during the civil war, relating chiefly to life in Andersonville prison, where he was confined as a prisoner of war when but fourteen years old. Mr. Powell in speaking of the horrors of that prison pen, related only such scenes and circumstances as came under his own personal observation. At the close of the lecture, in answer to a question, Mr. Powell expressed himself as in favor of returning the captured Confederate flags.

After Mr. Powell had finished, Singer's orchestra furnished vocal and instrumental music and ice cream and cake were served.

## Saloons and Restaurants.

It is likely that the Mayor will order the closing of a number of Sunday and all night restaurants in addition to that of Mr. Frank on practically the same ground, that though separated from saloons by thin board partitions they are nevertheless, properly speaking, in the same rooms and contrary to law. It is alleged that it has been the practice in many places to serve liquors at tables in the Sunday restaurants and it is this practice especially which the Mayor desires to stop.

Of course the rodent was disgusted.

## A FRENCH-CANADIAN EXODUS.

Mill Operatives Scared Away from New England Villages by War Talk.

There has been a large exodus of French-Canadian families from the mill villages of New England since the war talk began. It may not be the fear of war alone which have impelled those who have gone to pack up and scurry across the Canadian border, but the war has undoubtedly had very much influence in the matter. The operatives have been somewhat dissatisfied since wages were cut in the cotton mills, and the coming of the war added to their belief that this Yankee land was not the abode of milk and honey they had formerly thought it, says the New York Sun.

From all over the state and the villages in Connecticut and Massachusetts come reports of the French Canadian exodus. From Woonsocket alone 21 persons have left this week, and dozens of families had fled before. The Pawtucket valley villages tell the same story, and what is true of this section is also true of other New England villages.

It must not be supposed that all the French-Canadians in New England partake of this spirit. While these mill operatives are by no means a warlike people there are many among the younger element who would be glad to fight for the United States if they were needed.

Many of those who remain are very much troubled regarding the future, and mill men say that they are being constantly asked regarding the probability of aliens being drafted.

# CHINAMEN POOR HUSBANDS.

English Girls in Shanghai Who Wed Mongolians Always Have Cause to Regret It.

A Vancouver dispatch gives currency to certain scandalous stories current in Shanghai, by which English girls are represented as having formed the habit of marrying Chinese young men attached to the legation in that city. There might be no great harm in the marriage of a Chinese man to a Caucasian woman if the Mongolian could be educated up to the Caucasian matrimonial standard. But the complaint that comes from Shanghai is that the Chinese cling with great pertinacity to their Mongolian view of the marriage state. If the wife rebelled at this view of the marriage relation the Chinese husband would lock her up and when opportunity offered, sell her. An infusion of English blood in a matrimonial form does not seem to have much influence upon the customs of the country. The English wives, sensitive as to the shame of the lives they were forced to lead, would make no complaints to relatives in England. In most cases the marriage had been entered into in spite of the protests of parents, a circumstance which tended to silence complaints that would otherwise have been made. There is abundant ground for the conclusion that the average Chinese does not become a good Christian until the third or fourth generation.

Hughes got something to eat and started out. Cheney had heard him, and securing his shotgun met him at the cellar stairs and fired a charge of shot into his body. Hughes will die.
