New and Interesting Happenings Within Our Borders.

Use of Electricity on Canal Boats.

COLUMBUS, O., June 15.—The state board of public works in its session Tuesday took steps toward making a practical test of the use of electricity as a motive power for canal transportation. The board adopted a resolution authorizing W. G. Wagenhals, of Dayton, to make the test under the provisions of house bill of April 1, 1898. He is given the privilege of making a three-year test subject to the approval of the governor. His operations are to be confined to the Miami and Erie canal, and if he succeeds in demonstrating that he can make use of electricity to cheapen transportation as well as accelerate it to the satisfaction of the board, he is to be given a three-year franchise over that particular canal.

Pardons Granted.

COLUMBUS, O., June 15.—Pardons were granted Tuesday by Gov. Bushnell as follows: D. W. Brown, Wayne county, shooting with intent to kill; Benjamin Adams, Scioto, murder in second degree; Albert Ludlum, Shelby county, cutting with intent to wound; Wm. Quillen, Meigs, burglary; George Johnson, Coshocton, cutting to wound; Emil Herbiech, Hamilton, embezzlement; Wm. E. Cooper, Wayne, burglary; Charles Woodruff, Wayne, burglary; John G. Jones, Stark, illegal voting.

Gov. Bushnell's Appointments.

COLUMBUS, O., June 15.—Gov. Bushnell made the following appointments Wednesday: C. L. Kurtz and J. B. Luckey, state oil inspectors; C. C. Perkins, engineer state board of public works; S. B. Lightner, trustee Athens hospital; J. M. Pattison and James Poindexter, trustee of Wilberforce university; S. M. Owen, member of state arbitration board; Dr. Fletcher, of Cincinnati, member state dental board.

Completion of Courthouse Delayed.

UPPER SANDUSKY, O., June 15.—The completion of the new Wyandot county courthouse appears far in the future now. The latest feature is litigation begun by suit of Roseker & Son, contractors, against the county commissioners. They demand more definite plans and certain extras. The commissioners believe it a scheme to complicate matters for the purpose of indefinite delay.

Suspicion of Foul Play.

SPRINGFIELD, O., June 15.—A post mortem examination Tuesday developed a peculiar condition of the stomach and kidneys of Patrick Bolan, the wealthy real estate dealer, who died Tuesday morning. Dr. R. L. Bell said that the case may go to court. There is a suspicion that Bolan did not die a natural death. The stomach will be analyzed.

The Engle Poisoning Case.

LOGAN, O., June 15.—Arguments in the case of Mrs. J. S. Engle, charged with poisoning her husband, were begun Wednesday. The case will probably go to the jury Thursday. Mrs. Engle, on the stand, denied that she had ever wished her husband dead, or that she would like to trade him for a dog, that she might kill it.

Hence's Successor.

COLUMBUS, O., June 15.—Hon. W. E. Bundy, district attorney for the southern Ohio district, announced here Tuesday night that Assistant District Attorney Bruce, of Cincinnati, has resigned to make way for his successor. Mr. Bundy has recommended McPherson Brown, of Miami county, for the place.

Toledo Theater Falls.

TOLEDO, O., June 15.—The People's theater Tuesday passed into the hands of a receiver. R. R. Cranz, of the Holcomb national bank, was appointed to that position. The playhouse will open as usual next September under the same management—S. R. Brady and Chas. Stevens.

Secured a Clerkship.

MAEYSVILLE, O., June 15.—Dana Morey, who has been the bookkeeper in the bank of Marysville for the past several years, left here Tuesday night for Washington, D. C., where he has been appointed to a clerkship in the war department by Maj. Joe S. Wilkins at a salary of \$1,400 per year.

For Venable's Company.

GALLIPOLIS, O., June 15.—Nine young men left here Wednesday to join Capt. Venable's Cincinnati company. They were the first contribution to the army from this county, and every whistle and bell in town sounded Godspeed when they left on the steamer Stanley.

More Beer than There Are Need.

UPPER SANDUSKY, O., June 15.—Recruiting Officer Cameron, of Company B, 2d regiment, is here picking men to fill the quota of the company. He has picked 33 and has more offers than the required number.

RAT WITH A WOODEN LEG.

How an Inventive and Humane Philadelphia Boy Fitted Out His Captive.

A rat with a wooden leg is a curiosity, as curiosities go nowadays. Yet such an animal can be seen any day at the residence of a man named Dugmore, in the southwestern section of the city, reports the Philadelphia Times. About a month ago Willie Dugmore, a lad of 15 years, found the little rodent in a trap in the cellar. His first impulse was to brain the pest with a baseball bat, but the rat looked at him so pleadingly that Willie's heart was touched, and he decided to take the rat to an adjoining vacant lot and liberate the animal. This he did, but instead of scampering off, as he expected, the rat limped painfully up to him and began to lick his hand. Willie then discovered that one of the animal's legs had been almost severed by the trap.

Taking the rat home, he cut the leg off and then bandaged the wound, using as a liniment a little vaseline. He then put the rat into a cage and nursed it for a week.
