Death of Charles J. Sheppard.

Mr. Charles J. Sheppard, who has of late years made his home with his daughter, Mrs. Theodore Folger, at 627 Front street, died Sunday afternoon, the 6th instant, at the advanced age of 86 years.

Mr. Sheppard was one of the best known men in Marietta, having lived here the greater portion of his life. His profession was that of instructor in music, and for years he was prominently identified with that class of work.

Mr. Sheppard leaves two sons, Thos. L. and Charles J., and one daughter, Mrs. Theodore Folger.

The funeral services will be held this afternoon at 3 o'clock from his late home. Burial in Oak Grove cemetery.

The Board of Education met as usual Monday evening. Transacted the usual business and heard the Superintendent's report and adjourned.


