

Richard Croker smiled blandly when asked if it was true he was at the head of a many million dollar scheme to exploit compressed air as a motive power in New York City.

"Yes," he replied. "Your information on that point is absolutely correct. I am one of the incorporators of the New York Auto-Truck company, and we intend to do a general trucking business in New York, Brooklyn, Jersey City and the suburbs adjacent to those cities. I think I can safely predict the doing away with the present theories of trucking by the use of horses."

"We shall give the present truckmen an opportunity to join our enterprise. In my opinion, the horse as a pet for pleasure driving, speeding purposes and as a play toy in general will for all time hold a place in the affections of mankind, but for business purposes—the carriage of freight and passengers—he must recede before the advance of civilization and the requirements of the present inventive age.

"Self-propelling vehicles will allow the city of New York to be one of the most beautiful cities in the world, as the pavement can all be asphalted. The carriage of coal in Greater New York, representing an annual expenditure of \$7,500,000, is only a small part of the enormous amount expended in New York for the handling of freight and goods."

LABOR IN CHINA.

Consul Writes That Labor-Saving Devices Are Not Wanted—Man the Cheapest Article.

Labor-saving devices are not wanted in China. This is clearly shown by Consul-General Goodnow in a report to the state department, made in reply to an inquiry of an export association in New York.

"I cannot give you any encouragement," he says, "in regard to the shipment of wheelbarrows, scrapers, dump carts and the like to China. The wheelbarrow used here has one large wheel in the middle and a seat on either side, where passengers are carried. Once in a great while dirt is carried in baskets in such a barrow, but ordinarily it is carried by a coolie in two baskets hung on his shoulders. These baskets are about the size and shape of a grain scoop. Labor-saving devices are not in demand in China. The cheapest thing here is a man. There is more labor than can find employment. A coolie carrying dirt will receive from seven to ten cents gold per day. He must work from sunrise to sunset—no very steadily or intensely, but putting in a great many hours and accomplishing a large amount of work for the amount of wages paid. There are more coolies willing to work for this pittance than there is work for them to do."
