

GEN. DAWES DEAD.

The Distinguished Soldier and Well Known Business Man Quietly Passes Away.

The community will be greatly shocked to hear of the death of Gen. Rufus R. Dawes, General Dawes, though confined to his invalid chair for the past three years, has been able to attend to his business up to a few weeks ago.

Shortly after Commencement he was taken seriously ill and last night at a quarter to eleven o'clock he quietly passed away.

General Dawes leaves a wife and six children: Hon. C. G. Dawes, Comptroller of the Currency; Rufus C. Dawes, Evanston, Ill.; Beman G. Dawes, Newark, O.; Mary F. Beach, wife of Rev. A. G. Beach, Ashland, Wis.; Henry M. Dawes, who was associated with his father in business, and Betsey G. Dawes, who is attending school at Painesville, O. He was the brother of Major E. C. Dawes, of Cincinnati, O., who died three years ago. He leaves one sister, Mrs. Sarah J. Shedd, who is at present in this city.

General Dawes has made his home in Marietta since the close of the Civil War, in which he served with honor and distinction, and his death brings sorrow, not only to a devoted family, but also to a wide circle of friends and business associates.

Dynamiters Acquitted.

Burt Thomas, who was tried before Squire Kidd Monday, charged with dynamiting fish, was acquitted Monday night at 11 o'clock. The defense introduced no evidence whatever.

After Thomas' acquittal, the prosecution stated that as the evidence against the other parties, Nelson, Bowers, William Schimmel, Herman March, Lewis Smith and Osmer Barker, arrested on the same charge, was the same as in Thomas' case, they asked that the defendants be released, which was done.

Lewis Smith was held to answer to the charge of selling liquor without a license.

Commissioners Meeting.

At their meeting yesterday, the Commissioners had under consideration the proposition of the Ohio Central Electric Company for the construction of an electric railway from Marietta to Helpe. No action was taken in the matter.

On account of the great expense attached to the undertaking the Commissioners have refused to grant the request for paving the Cow Run road from the corporation line to the Duck Creek bridge. Members of the Good Roads Association are still urging a favorable decision.

Ohio Teacher Sold to Marietta Parties.

The Ohio Teacher, a journal which has for some time been published by Dr. McBurney at Cambridge, has been sold to Prof. Martin R. Andrews of Marietta College, and Supt. H. G. Williams, of the Marietta public schools. The office of the publication will be removed to this city and the new owners will publish their first number of the Teacher about the middle of this month.

The Ohio Teacher is favorably known in State educational circles and the new owners will keep it up to the standard.

Is Open, and Doing Business.

The German National Bank opened its doors in its temporary quarters in Wittig's jewelry store, and started out auspiciously.

The operating force at present consists of S. L. Angle, cashier; John Langer, teller; Dwight Loomis, messenger. Miss Adele Hogan, as bookkeeper, will go on duty in about two weeks.

For the present, until the bank's new safe arrives and is placed in position, the institution will use the vault in the County Treasurer's office.

Daylight Excursions.

The new steamer City of Pittsburg has opened up the daylight excursion business between this city and Louisville. It has been many years since the people have had an opportunity to make the trip in daylight and thus get the benefit of the beautiful scenery between the Queen City and the Falls City, and doubtless a great many passengers will take advantage of the low fare and fine steambest to make the trip once more during the season.—Commercial Tribune.

For Shooting a Horse.

An affidavit has been filed with Squire Smithson by David S. Booth, of Macksburg, charging Elmer Wickens of that place, with shooting a fine Percheron horse belonging to Booth. Mr. Booth has also instituted proceedings against Wickens for the recovery of the value of the horse. The shooting occurred last Sunday and was the result of neighborhood difficulties. Both parties are prominent and well to do farmers.
