POTTER'S MISTAKES.

His Contributions to Aguinaldoism Analyzed.

His Disregard of Potent Facts

A Weak Attempt to Beg the Question on Imperialism and the Duty of America in the Philippines—Peace is the First Requisite to Government.

Bishop Henry C. Potter of the Protestant Episcopal church has entered the political arena to tell the American citizen his views of the political aspect of the Philippine question.

The Democratic party is using his utterances as a campaign weapon against the administration's policy in the Philippines.

The prelate delivered an address at the opening of the nineteenth congress of the Protestant Episcopal church at St. Paul on last Tuesday. It was not a discussion of church doctrine, or church government, or the life of the church, but a discussion of the topic, "Does National Expansion Involve Imperialism?"

As a doctor of divinity the lessons of the bishop in matters pertaining to the religious life have the weight of authority. But Bishop Potter is not a statesman any more than Secretary Hay is a bishop.

An examination of the speech alleged to have been made by him and being used by the Democrats as a campaign document, leads to the suspicion that the bishop has not fully considered the Philippine question.

In his treatment of the subject he does not present the facts involved in the case, and then give the conclusions deducible from them. He simply offers his opinions in a general way. There is no doubt that he holds

Views Similar to Those of Atkinson, the Boston leader of the anti-expansionist copperheads. He believes that this country has already entered upon a policy of imperialism. He defined imperialism as a principle which takes away universal suffrage and renounces the government to the will of an individual. If this be a correct definition of imperialism then this country has not entered upon it. The future government of the Philippines is not in the hands of one man, but in the hands of congress. This country has never had absolute universal suffrage. The inhabitants of our territories have never enjoyed the privilege of suffrage; neither do the Indians, who have been so long with us. But these, who do not enjoy the suffrage of a vote, are not governed by one man, but by congress. Nor is there any probability that there will ever be a constitutional amendment to take this power from congress for the purpose of giving it to one man. As the case stands at present, the United States accepted the Philippines from Spain, and the president of the United States is simply

endeavoring to preserve peace and order in the new possessions brought to us by the legislative act of the treaty-making power of the nation, viz: the United States senate. The bishop also believes that this nation did not act diplomatically when we first went to the Philippines. He said: "Now it would seem at least reasonable that the conquering or purchasing republic should inaugurate its relations to its new possessions by some conference with its dominant people. But no. Its first word is submission. Its first demand is surrender. Its first and second conditions are: 'We will recognize nobody, we will treat with nobody, we alone will dictate all the terms.' The policy does not work happily. These pestiferous wards of the nation will not lay down their arms, and these alien communities, instead of hailing the stars and stripes with a wild delight, are actually insolent enough to intimate that they would rather salute a flag of their own."

It is observed that Bishop Potter does not suggest how such a conference could be held with the dominant peoples. To confer with self-conceited leaders would be an encouragement to militarism and despotism. An election of representatives of the dominant peoples would have to take place before a conference could be held, and peace and order are absolutely necessary to such an election. When peace is established in the islands, then representative government will and can follow. The bishop overlooks the fact, however, that peace is the first requisite.

The bishop has surely forgotten that our government made a proclamation to the people promising them the most beneficent form of government designable by our liberty-loving statesmen.

against his government. Bishop Potter gets far astray. He said: "To undertake to superimpose upon them our free institutions would seem to be an utterly hopeless task, and in such a situation, what is the alternative but a form of government which, while not nominally, yet practically, in its essential absolutism, is imperial?"

It seems strange that the bishop should imagine that these liberty-loving Filipinos should make it an utterly hopeless task for us to impose our free institutions upon them. True they do not understand them, and what is more, the designing leaders of the insurrectionists are doing their utmost to prevent them doing so. The administration will undertake to give the whole people there a taste of the delights of free institutions, the contrary efforts of Aguinaldo and his sympathizers notwithstanding.

The bishop states that it was the loss of homogeneity that destroyed ancient Rome, and he fears for this country, because of its heterogeneity. But homogeneity is a stranger to the United States. We have always been a mixed people. The bishop is simply making a bogie out of what the nation has thrived under for a century.

It was not the loss of homogeneity that destroyed Rome. It was a Lack of Patriotism, superinduced by effeminacy, and moral corruptness. As long as the fires of patriotism burn in American hearts, so long as our public schools send forth into the world intelligent citizens, and our churches teach the beautiful truths enunciated by the Man of Galilee, we need not fear that this nation will go the way of ancient Rome. But, let the waters of a pseudo-sentimentalism extinguish the fires of patriotism, bring our flag down before the eyes of the world in shame, let the emissaries of the cross forget their high calling and offer their flocks the husks of partisan politics instead of the water and bread of life; when our law-abiding citizens become luxury-loving and licentious as the Romans did, then, O my country! you may look for your destruction. But not till then.
