Annual Meeting of First Congregational Church.

The members of the First Congregational church of this city held their annual meeting Wednesday night, in the Lecture room of their church. The attendance was quite large.

Addresses were delivered by various members, covering the different lines of work in and about the city. Rev. Charles Stanley, of Tien-Tsin, China, was present and talked in a very interesting manner of the work in the far east.

The following church officers were elected: Clerk, John Kaiser; Treasurer, T. D. Bisce; Deacons, W. W. Mills, T. D. Bisce; church committee, J. S. Simpson, W. H. Lord. Before the business session, those present, numbering about two hundred sat down to a sumptuous banquet prepared by the ladies of the church.

Dangerous.

The ice gorge is now solid from Marietta to Parkersburg and unless the warm weather prevails for several days it will possibly block up the mouth of the Muskingum and the Marietta river front. Rivermen are hopeful that the warm spell will continue long enough to melt the ice now in the river and allow it to run out before the next cold spell sets in. Unless such is the condition in the future the river will become blocked with ice and the damage resulting therefrom during the prevalence of the gorge and when the ice runs out will be great. However, the outlook at present is encouraging, as the weather indications are for warmer weather and a breaking up of the ice blockades.

In a Tight Place.

The steamer Francis J. Torrence, now being built at Knox's boatyards, is in a very dangerous position owing to the gorging of the ice in the Ohio river. Her present position is far from adding to the satisfaction of her owners or builders and efforts will be made to have the Catherine Davis bring her up into the mouth of the Muskingum, out of the way of the dangerous masses of ice that are filling the Ohio river from bank to bank.

Marietta Transfer Building.

The big building of the Marietta Transfer and Storage Co. will be finished in about two weeks. Although the greater part of the building is already in use, the work is still being carried on by a force of carpenters and others who are adding the finishing touches. The building is being wired throughout for electric lights. The immense elevator was fully completed last evening and it is giving great satisfaction.
