## INTERESTING NEWS ITEMS.

The United States cruiser New York has arrived at Port au Prince, Hayti. George Prier, of Norfolk, Va., was placed in jail for brutally kicking his 10-year-old son Fred.

Ed Snyder, aged 17 years, of Ripley, W. Va., was run over and killed by a wagon loaded with a sawmill boiler.

K. L. Grubbs, an insane prisoner in jail at Portsmouth, Va., set fire to the building and narrowly escaped being cremated.

Herman Schmiedgen, a resident of Chicago for fifty years, and father of William Schmiedgen, the well known artist, is dead.

The deepest snow that has fallen in the vicinity of Wichita, Kan., in years covers the ground Wednesday morning. It is a foot deep on the level.

J. Pierpont Morgan has engaged passage, it is said, on the Oceanic on March 31, when he will make his usual spring trip to London and the continent.

The body of a well-dressed man, aged about 25 years, was found in the Ohio river near Woodland Station, W. Va. There was nothing to identify the body.

Senator Spooner introduced a joint resolution for a commission to visit European commercial colleges, with a view of extending United States commerce in Europe.

Gen. Thomas M. Anderson, who until his retirement a few weeks ago was commander of the department of the lakes, will leave Chicago Thursday, and in the future will make his home at Columbus, O.

During the carnival procession at Caracas, Venezuela, a Venezuelan fired two shots at President Cripiano Castro, without effect. The president was afterwards acclaimed by the populace. The city is quiet.

## TAIL-END COLLISION.

Mrs. Schmidlapp and Daughter of Cincinnati, and an Unknown Woman Killed—Others Hurt.

Kansas City, Mo., March 1.—Three persons are dead and seven others are seriously injured as a result of Tuesday night's tail-end collision on the Missouri Pacific railroad at Independence, Mo.

The dead—Mrs. J. G. Schmidlapp, Cincinnati; an unknown woman, cremated, believed to be from St. Louis; Miss Emma Schmidlapp, of Cincinnati, died at 10:15 Wednesday morning.

Injured—W. R. Vaughan, a Cincinnati newspaper man, arm broken in two places; Mrs. J. R. Balke, mother of Mrs. Schmidlapp, arm broken, badly lacerated about the face; J. C. Schmidlapp, husband of Mrs. Schmidlapp, arm broken and head bruised; L. F. Sheldon, Sedalia, badly bruised and cut; William Ryan, baggage master, slightly injured.

The dead and injured were brought to this city and placed in hospitals. Mrs. Schmidlapp's body was taken to the morgue. The body of the unknown woman is still underneath the wreck of the engine and parlor car.

The railroad officials are severely censured for the delay in getting a relief train to the scene, but they claim that the blinding snow storm and the position of a freight train on the track made it impossible for them to reach the wreck sooner.

The blame of the wreck is attached to one. It is conceded that the storm had rendered conditions such that the wreck could not have been prevented.

Vaughan, the Cincinnati newspaper man, whose arm was crushed and who was pinioned for some time under a window frame, displayed great nerve in waiting to be extricated. He waited three hours for medical treatment.

## REPUBLICAN CONGRESSIONAL CONVENTION, FIFTEENTH DISTRICT.

The Republican Congressional Convention of the Fifteenth District of Ohio, was held Tuesday, April 10th, 1900 at 10:30 o'clock a. m.

To nominate one candidate for Congress, one Presidential elector and to select two delegates and two alternates to the Republican National Convention.


