Old Map of Marietta.

In searching the records of the court yesterday, Mr. McVay, of the Clerk's office found a very interesting and valuable map of Marietta, which was prepared under the direction of Rufus Putnam in 1802.

Although yellow with age, the map is still in a splendid state of preservation and is well worthy the inspection of those who are interested in the early history of the town.

In spite of the fact that he city has made wonderful progressive strides since 1802, a glance at the map of the East Side portion of the city shows that the additions made to the city have been comparatively small in the ninety-eight years since the map was made.

Some notable features of the map are as follows: What is now known as Wooster street is plainly marked Worcester street and one is led to think when the change was made in the spelling of the name.

In notes around the margin of the map, the maker gives the width of the various streets, the description of various portions dedicated to public use, and much other information that is valuable and equally interesting to Marietta people who take an interest in city affairs of the present day.

Passed the House of Representatives Yesterday Afternoon.

Columbus, O. March 1.—The bill for the reorganization of the government of Cincinnati, commonly known as the Cox Ripper Bill, came to a vote in the House today. It passed by a vote of 60 to 43.

Under the provisions of this bill the Governor is given the power of appointing the members of Cincinnati's legislative board, thereby removing the board from local influence, politically.
