**River News.**  
 The river is falling at all points at present, but there is still a good stage and all boats are making good time and doing a good business. A very large amount of freight is being handled. At the local wharf last evening there was a stage of 16 feet.  
 The Lorena for Zanesville passed at 8 p. m. Sunday with a big cargo of freight, part of her load being a big shipment of glass consigned to Parkersburg. It was unloaded here and taken to Parkersburg yesterday by the Duffey.  
 The Virginia went down Sunday evening with a big trip in freight and a fair passenger list. She received a shipment here of 123 barrels of apples for Cincinnati.  
 The Queen City went up on time yesterday afternoon with a good trip.  
 The Eloise came down at a late hour last night, discharged her cargo and left at once on her return to Wheeling.  
 The Barnsdall, in the Sistersville-Marietta trade, and the Duffey, in the St. Marys-Marietta trade, are hustling for the freight business on the down trip every morning. While they are not exactly racing, they are going after the trade in a way that makes things lively sometimes.  
 Boats today are the Ben Hur for Parkersburg this morning and Pittsburg this evening; Bedford from Wheeling tonight, return tomorrow morning, and the Keystone State for Cincinnati tonight.

**Bids Opened.**  
 The bids for the \$90,000 worth of Waterworks refunding bonds, bearing interest at 3 1/2 per cent, were opened at noon yesterday by the City Clerk. The only member of the Finance Committee, who witnessed the opening of the bids was Dr. Curtis.  
 Eight firms entered bids for the bonds, but one firm's bid was not considered, it being that of W. R. Todd & Co., of Cleveland, who bid on 4 per cent bonds.  
 Seasongood, Meyer & Co., of Cincinnati, were the highest bidders, and they will probably get the bonds by action of Council this evening. They are the holders of the old bonds.
