TROOPS FOR CHINA

United States, Germany and Austria Order More Forces to the Orient.

THE RELIEF COLUMN REACHES PEKIN.

News of the Reported Fight There Last Sunday Are Lacking and the Legations Are Safe.

The Yorktown Arrives at Chefoo—The Mission at Sen Chow Was Looted and the Missions Carried Off.

Shanghai, June 21.—Reports from Chinese sources, credited by local foreign officials here, say the legations at Peking were safe June 17 (Monday) and that Adm. Seymour, with the relieving column, reached Peking that day.

London, June 21.—The news from Shanghai Wednesday was regarded in official circles as distinctly cheering. After the grim reports current early Wednesday morning, the dispatch announcing the arrival at Peking of the relief expedition commanded by Adm. Seymour and the safety of the legations, which later was confirmed by a dispatch from Shanghai, published in the second edition of the London Times, announcing on the authority of Taotai Sheng, that Seymour's force arrived at the Chinese capital June 17, presages, it is hoped, a general brightening of the situation. No details have yet been received of the casualties or of the condition of affairs at Peking, but well informed people express the opinion that the summing up of Li Hung Chang to the capital forebodes the early submission of the dowager empress to the dictates of the powers.

Washington, June 21.—An embargo was received at the state department Wednesday morning from United States Consul Fowler at Chefoo, The consul said that no communication had been had with Peking for six days past; that the mission at Sen Chow has been looted, but that the Chinese general carried the missionaries off in safety to an unknown place. The Chinese ships in the harbor have left for the south. The Russians continue to land troops at Taku.

A cablegram has been received at the navy department from Commander Tausig announcing the arrival of the Yorktown at Chefoo from Taku, where he went with dispatches from the department. Another cablegram is expected shortly from Tausig describing conditions at Taku.

GARDINER A FIEND INCARNATE

While Locked in a Dungeon He Murderously Assaults Another Prisoner and His Guard.

Chillicothe, O., June 21.—Richard Gardiner, jailed here for the alleged murder of Ethel Long, has proved a fiend incarnate. Lodged in a dungeon Monday for murdering another prisoner and holding the officers at bay. He is possessed of almost superhuman strength, and succeeded in twisting off his leg from Yesterday Mark Danvers perched in at Gardiner through the slit which lights the dungeon, and was dealt a stunning blow across the face with the leg iron, injuring him severely.

The turnkey hurried to the scene and found that Gardiner had armed himself with a heavy iron bar which had formed a portion of his cot, and which, with bull-like strength, he had succeeded in wrenching from the solid cement of the cell wall. When commanded to pass this dangerous weapon out through the slit he defied the authorities and dared them to come in and take it from him. Sheriff Swepton is out of town, so no drastic measures were taken against the prisoner, who still has his weapon, but when the sheriff returns the Negro will probably be deprived of food until he surrenders.

Philadelphia, June 21.—Chairman Wolcott called the convention to order at 12:30, and the delegates stood up while the band played the "Star Spangled Banner."
The report of the committee on permanent organization was adopted, and Senator Lodge, the permanent chairman, was escorted to the chair by Gov. Roosevelt and Gov. Shaw, of Iowa. The convention cheered.
Senator Lodge was introduced and made an address.
Senator Lodge concluded at 1:30. He had spoken fifty minutes. Then followed the usual gavel presentations. Col. Childs, of Ohio, in a neat speech, presented a historical gavel, the mahogany from the capital at Providence, the bronze from the yacht Columbia, which defeated the Shamrock at the international yacht race last fall. A young delegate from Kentucky, John W. Langley, mounted the platform and in an eloquent little speech presented another gavel carved from a tree in the valley of the Big Sandy beneath which Gen. Garfield is said to have knelt at the battle of Middle Creek and asked the God of battles to give the union forces victory. He stirred the delegates with his eloquence, and they cheered when he concluded with the statement that he presented the gavel as a pledge of the continued devotion of Kentucky to the principles of republicanism and a hostage that the state would fall give its electoral vote to McKinley and Roosevelt.
