

**Burglary Committed.**  
Early Friday morning the tailoring establishment of Karl Shafer and the Windsor saloon, both on lower Front street, were entered by burglars and a quantity of goods were stolen.

At Shafer's place the thieves entered the tailor shop in the rear, by prying open a back window. They ransacked the place and not finding any money, satisfied themselves by taking some clothing and gents furnishing goods, the latter being taken from shelves and show cases in the store. The value of the goods stolen is about \$75.

In a like manner entrance was effected to the Windsor saloon. The cash register was open and contained a small amount of change, which was taken, but a bag with \$39 in it was not found.

The watch dog in the saloon did not molest the thief, but went upstairs and woke up the bartender, who sleeps there. He took his gun and went downstairs, but the thief had escaped. The bartender notified the police, but the burglars had made themselves too scarce to find and they are still at large.

**Jumped the Track.**  
An engine on a light freight on the O. & L. K. Ry. jumped the track at Beckett's station, about fifteen miles below Malta, Wednesday morning about 9 o'clock, rolling over down the embankment. The fireman jumped from the window on the side toward which the engine fell and barely managed to escape being crushed as the locomotive rolled over. Engineer Howard Smith stuck to the cab and remained uninjured, though badly shaken up and for a time fastened in the cab from the position of the engine. Times Recorder.

**Another Guusher.**  
Attention has again been called to the shallow sand territory near Chesertill by the strike made by Lovell & Co. in their No. 13 on the Enn Bowman farm, in the west end of Washington county. The well came in much like the gushers that were struck in other parts of the field several weeks ago, and which attracted the attention of the oil fraternity in general.

The Bowman No. 13 will make at least 200 barrels per day natural. K. of P. Picnic.  
The Pioneer City Lodge, Knights of Pythias, are making extensive arrangements for a picnic for themselves and friends at Blennerhassett Island, on Wednesday, August 8. It will be an all day affair and one that promises a great deal of enjoyment for the participants. Music will be furnished by the Oliver Scott orchestra and the steamer Sonoma will carry the picnickers to and from the island.

**Moving Old Bridge Iron.**  
The iron taken from the eastern approach of the old Putnam street bridge is being removed to the mouth of Dana's Run in Newport township, where it will be used in constructing a bridge to replace an old one. The spans were purchased by the County Commissioners from the Pittsburg Bridge Company and the remaining one will be used for a bridge near Macksburg.

**The Old Fellows of the city** are making extensive preparations to attend the annual Wildley picnic at McConnellsville on August 2. About fifty lodges from the southeastern part of the state will be represented and as usual the affair will be a great success. Low rates will be made via the O. & L. K. and a special train will bring the picnickers home late in the evening.

**Want to Furnish Gas Supply.**  
Archer & Berry, of Caldwell, have asked the Lowell council for the franchise to lay their pipes, etc., for the purpose of supplying the town with natural gas. The matter was to be up for final disposal at the meeting of the council last night.

The gas wells from which they expect to get their supply are located in the Macksburg territory.

**Cut His Face.**  
H. E. Nichols, an employe on the new bridge, had his lip badly hurt while at work yesterday. He was carrying some stone when his foot slipped and he fell, his face striking the sharp corner of a stone. His lip was cut and the wound profusely.

A physician was called and the injury received attention.

**SUICIDE.**

**Walter Kenny Blows Out His Brains**  
As the Result of a Love Affair.

Walter Kenny, an employe of Peter Grubb's bottling works, committed suicide at the Hotel Boyer about 8:40 last evening.

Kenny came here about a year ago from Indianapolis, where his father, who is a minister, formerly lived. He secured employment in the city and registered as a regular boarder at Mrs. Green's boarding house, Second street. Here he met Lilly Britton, a domestic employed by Mrs. Greene, and began paying marked attention to the girl. His attachment was evidently reciprocated by the girl and the usual consummation of such affairs was expected. But lately Kenny became too insistent in his attentions and Miss Britton tried to discourage his advances. This action only intensified the jealousy with which Kenny regarded all the girl's actions, and the surveillance which he exercised over her was very much increased by the attention which another young man had been paying her.

Last night Kenny made an appointment with the girl to meet him in the park. They returned from the park about 8:30 and had evidently had a lovers' quarrel.

Kenny was very much excited and tried to force Miss Britton to go out with him again, but this she refused to do, as his actions were very threatening. They then separated, Miss Britton going into the hotel and Kenny staying to talk with some acquaintances on the back porch of the hotel.

He besought his friends to take good care of Miss Britton when he was gone and see that she never lacked comforts. Then saying "It's all up with me. Good bye," he went down into the basement and there shot himself. Only one shot was fired and this took effect in his right temple, penetrating the brain and causing almost instant death.

When the employe of the hotel reached the spot the body was quivering spasmodically, but life was practically extinct.

Drs. Eddy and McClure were hurriedly summoned, but their efforts were of no avail. Coroner John McClure was summoned and viewed the body, after which it was removed to Fuller's undertaking establishment.

Kenny leaves one sister, Mrs. Macaroy, who lives back of Williamstown. She will be informed of the occurrence as soon as possible. The body will, in the meantime, remain at Fuller's undertaking establishment until word is received from the relatives.

**Pardon Refused to Albert Bates.**  
Wheeling, W. Va., July 20.—The Board of Pardons was in session yesterday at Moundsville. Judge Brannon and Mr. Morris were both present and passed upon a number of applications. The following persons were refused: Chas. Williams, sent up for life from Mercer county for murder; Benjamin Hicks, (papers did not show the particulars of his crime); Albert Bates, from Wood county, for attempted rape, five years; James Hall, from McDowell county, three and one half years for forgery; J. B. Fleming, from Logan county, 18 years for murder; and Mrs. Francis Dixon, who is doing a six month's jail sentence in Berkeley county.

The Board will continue in session today and perhaps tomorrow, and will consider a great many applications that were presented at the last meeting, held July 5.
